Clock tower restoration begins Monday

City Hall parking lot to be closed for project's duration

The project to rehabilitate the City Hall clock tower begins this Monday, Aug. 15, and is expected to be completed in mid-

Center hours:

Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. November.

On Monday, the contractor will mobilize to the site and begin erecting scaffolding on the roof of the building, around the clock tower. Work will begin in earnest during the last week of August or the first week of September once the scaffolding is installed and hazardous material tests on the site are complete.

The work includes removing the building antenna, repairing and restoring the gold leaf dome, copper roofing, metal sheeting and clock faces. It also includes repair or replacement of bell tower horizontal slats (louvers), repair of wiring within the bell and clock tower and replacement of internal wooden bead board ceiling. Lastly, the work includes the restoration of the exterior dome, repairing clock hands and mechanisms, replacing clock glass on the clock face in front of the building, replacing the roof access door for the clock tower and painting all exterior surfaces.

After a competitive bid, the City Council <u>awarded the contract</u> to Careno Construction Co. LLC of Portsmouth for a cost not to exceed \$576,000.

Parking restrictions

City Hall's back parking lot will be closed for the project's duration, starting Monday, Aug. 15; the parking lot will be used by the contractor to stage equipment.

Parking in front of City Hall on Central Avenue will also be closed for up to two weeks from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, starting Monday, Aug. 15. The closure is to facilitate the installation of staging equipment.

City Hall visitors are encouraged to utilize the free, 30-minute parking spaces in the circle in front of the Dover Public Library.

Public feedback sought on Fifth and Grove project before work begins on final design

The City of Dover seeks public feedback through a brief survey to help guide design work for the Fifth Street and Grove Street Reconstruction Project.

The survey questions include questions about the layout of sidewalks, trees, use of sump pumps, water ponding issues and whether property owners in the project area seek modifications of their driveway curb cut.

The reconstruction project includes the replacement of water mains and stormwater drainage; repairing or replacing sections of the sanitary sewer line; reconstruction of Fifth Street; restoration of Grove Street; and sidewalks on both sides of the street, among other work.

City to begin work on updating Master Plan's Vision Chapter

The City of Dover is about to embark on another cycle of updating its Master Plan, its comprehensive plan to guide long-term development in the city. It recently completed its last Master Plan cycle, with the Planning Board's recent adoption of the 2022 Community Facilities and Utilities chapter, available here. This chapter analyzed Dover's municipal facilities and

services and the public and private utilities that are depended on daily by residents and businesses

About every ten years, the City of Dover reviews each chapter of its Master Plan, beginning with the Visioning Chapter. Last updated in 2012, this chapter describes the long-term view of the city, as captured through a community-wide visioning process, which included a citizen's lead steering committee.

This chapter, entitled **Building Our Tomorrow**, includes three main components:

- 1. The Vision Statement that describes characteristics the community wants to possess.
- 2. Vision Themes that describe the Vision Statement in eight functional categories.
- 3. Vision Elements that explain how the vision can be accomplished.

To help update the Visioning Chapter, the City Council authorized contracting with Resilience Planning and Design, LLC of Plymouth for professional consulting services. The city will again form a citizens steering committee to ensure that the updated Vision Chapter is broadly accessible and reflects Dover's vision for the future. The Planning Board will appoint committee members in the coming weeks. With the help of Resilience Planning and Design, the steering committee with gather feedback from community members, businesses, community organizations and the city and school district.

Plans for the visioning process will become available as it is developed. City Council authorizes warming center operation for this winter

The City Council, at its Aug. 10 meeting, authorized operating the Dover-owned facility on Willand Drive in Somersworth as a warming center for the coming winter.

The authorization allows the warming center to operate on an as-needed basis during extreme cold weather events, determined by the emergency management directors of the tri-cities, in consultation with state officials. City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr., told the Council the goal of the



warming center's operation is to preserve life during extreme weather conditions when there are few beds available in the region's shelters.

Somersworth passed a similar resolution at its Aug. 1 meeting. Rochester's City Council is slated to take up the topic at an Aug. 16 special meeting.

At Dover's meeting, the mayors of Rochester and Somersworth spoke in support of the measure, along with Strafford County Commission Chair George Maglaras. Maglaras discussed the commissioners' long-term vision to build a new Riverside Rest Home state-of-the-art nursing facility on county land and turn the current facility into a transitional shelter for those who are unhoused. Joyal urged anyone who is in need of housing, medical care or food to contact their local public welfare office. Under state welfare statutes, municipalities are required to provide emergency shelter, food and medical care. Dover's public welfare office is located in the McConnell Center

at 61 Locust St. It is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Contact the welfare office at 603-516-6500; for after-hours assistance, contact Dover Police at 603-742-4646.

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, located here.

Aug. 12, 1875 — From the Dover Enquirer: "As a team in which two ladies and five children were crossing the bridge at Dover Point, the horses became frightened by an awning on a boat


which was passing underneath, and began to prance. The lady who was driving, fearing that she might wreck the carriage or spring over the rail, whipped him into a trot, being desirous to get over the bridge quickly. As she did so, she casually noticed a sign forbidding horses to go over the bridge faster than a walk on penalty of a fine. This led her to pull in the frightened animal, and just as she had done so, she saw that she was within a few feet of the open draw, which is a swinging draw. Had she allowed the animal to have gone on at the speed he had attained, he would have plunged into the boiling flood below, and seven lives would have been lost. There is a gate or bar on the bridge to prevent just such occurrences and the criminal neglect of the toll-gate keeper to use it might have resulted in a very serious catastrophe."

Aug. 14, 1925 — Dover's new downtown electric street light system is turned on at 8 p.m. for the first time. To celebrate the event, a "Mardi Gras" is held, including 4,000 people in the carnival parade and 10 bands. Over 20,000 people attend the festivities. Aug. 17, 1925 — From Foster's Daily Democrat: "Last Saturday morning, the M&M Bakeries, Inc. of Dover inaugurated the first air delivery of fresh baked bread in New England, if not the world, when a speedy plane made the trip of 12 miles as the crow flies, to Portsmouth, in 7 minutes, 12 seconds. The delivery was made in less than 25 minutes of the receipt of a request for extra loaves."

Aug. 18, 1933 — Insurance companies agree to pay the City of Dover \$151,000 for the loss of City Hall, which burned down on Aug. 3 that same year. City Hall was built in 1892 at a cost of \$250,000.

Aug. 17, 2001 — Friends, family and coworkers held a farewell ceremony for Dover firefighter Doug Conway, who retired from Dover Fire & Rescue after 24 years. Conway, who was then 45, was planning to start his "second career" at Dover Middle School as a teaching aide working with special education students. Conway said he chose public service because of his family background: his father was a police officer for eight years, his mother was always helping her friends and neighbors, his three sisters worked in nursing, child care and elderly care, and his brother, Richard, was then the police chief in Barrington. During the ceremony, Conway was recognized for his contributions to Fire & Rescue projects including the George Grenier Fund, a fund for the needy and the Toys for Tots program. Conway also served as president of the local firefighters union, the Dover Professional Firefighters Local 1312.

Absentee ballots for the state primary election on Tuesday, Sept. 13, 2022, are now available at the City Clerk's Office.

Any registered voter unable to vote on either Election Day or who cannot make it to the polls because of a disability, religious observance, or employment obligations may request an absentee ballot from the City Clerk's Office in person or by mail. The online absentee ballot application is <u>available here</u>.



Voters may also request an absentee ballot for the Tuesday, Nov. 8 general election. Absentee ballots for the general election will not be available until early October.

The City Clerk's Office is located in the Customer Service Center at City Hall. Its regular business hours are Monday through Thursday, 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., and Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. The mailing address is 288 Central Avenue, Dover, NH 03820.
