Curbside trash and recycling delayed one day all week

City administrative offices, including City Hall, will be closed on Monday, Sept. 1, 2025, for Labor Day. Regular hours will resume on Tuesday, Sept. 2, 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

The Public Library is closed Saturday, Aug. 30, through Monday, Sept. 1, for the Labor Day holiday weekend.

Inspection Services, located on Mast Road, is closed on Labor Day.

All Recreation facilities are closed on Labor Day, with the exception of the Dover Arena, which will open at 4 p.m. for Dover Youth Hockey. The Dover Arena will be closed Friday, Aug. 29, through Sunday, Aug. 31.

Curbside trash and recycling pickup will be delayed by one day all week for the holiday.

Labor Day is a "parking holiday." Metered parking is free on parking holidays, except for the Orchard Street Parking Garage and Transportation Center Lot, which are paid parking at all times.




Deadline to order Veterans Park for Veterans Day is Sunday

The Recreation Department will place an order for engraved bricks to be added to Dover Veterans Park for Veterans Day in November. The deadline to have bricks included in that order is Sunday, Aug. 31

Orders collected after the deadline through February 2026 will be sent in the next batch to be installed in the park for Memorial Day. The cost is \$100 for an 8-inch by 8-inch brick and \$50 for a 4-inch by 8-inch brick. The only requirement for an engraved brick is that the person must be a veteran. Veterans do not have to be Dover residents. All bricks are engraved with a full name, military rank and branch, and years of service and/or conflict. Upon request, bricks may also be grouped by family or service time.

Court and Union Reconstruction Project begins Tuesday

Detours to be in effect daily

A significant street reconstruction project will begin on Tuesday, Sept. 2. The project limits include the entire length of Court Street, Union Street, from Central Avenue to Court Street, and Middle Road, from Hubbard Road to Court Street.

The project will upgrade underground utilities, improve stormwater drainage, add sidewalks and bike lanes, and improve safety features, such as traffic calming, crosswalks and handicap accessibility.

After a competitive bid process, the City Council authorized contracting with S.U.R. Construction, Inc., of Rochester, for \$9.5 million to complete the project. The contractor will mobilize to the site on Tuesday, Sept. 2, with crews bringing equipment and supplies to the project area. They will also remove seven trees within the public right-of-way.

Once the work site is prepped, crews will begin work on Court Street at the Central Avenue intersection, working towards Union Street. Once they reach Union Street, they will work

on that section to Central Avenue. The contractor anticipates that work on Court Street and Union Street will overlap. These areas will be connected to a temporary water system through December 2025. During the winter, the contractor anticipates installing stormwater drainage on Court Street east of Union Street.

The following traffic and parking restrictions will be in place on weekdays from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. once the project begins:

- Court Street will be closed to through traffic between Central Avenue and Union Street
- Union Street will be closed to through traffic between Central Avenue and Court Street
- Street parking will also be prohibited in the work area

The contractor will accommodate local traffic getting to and from their destinations in the work zone.

Section of Broadway targeted for paving in mid-September

Paving operations for a section of Broadway are targeted to begin in mid-September, weather and other conditions permitting.

The section of street, Broadway from Oak Street to Florence Street, will be reclaimed. Reclamation is the process of grinding the existing pavement in place and mixing it with the existing base gravel material to improve the strength of the base. The reclaimed material can be shaped to re-establish the roadway cross-section and improve stormwater drainage. After the reclamation process, the section will receive a new layer of pavement.

Motorists should anticipate lane closures and/or detours when the work begins.

The work is part of the Oak and Broadway water main project that is nearing completion. The City Council this week authorized the reclamation and paving as an additional scope of work for the project, as the numerous water main breaks in the area have caused extensive damage to the roadway subbase and undermined much of the roadway pavement.

Next week, the contractor will continue connecting water services to the new water main, which will require water service disruptions. The city and contractor will alert affected properties in advance.

City Council proclaims Constitution Week and National Service Dog Month

At its Aug. 27 meeting, the Dover City Council issued two proclamations recognizing Constitution Week and National Service Dog Month.

Mayor Robert Carrier proclaimed Sept. 17–23 as Constitution Week, commemorating the anniversary of the U.S. Constitution.

"Constitution Week is a great opportunity for citizens to learn about, understand, and defend the Constitution," he said, reading from the proclamation.

Carrier also declared September as National Service Dog Month, honoring the invaluable support service dogs provide to individuals with disabilities. At the meeting, the proclamation was accepted by Brendan Madden, founder of Service Dogs NH, a nonprofit established in 2018 to help service-dog owners with veterinary and related expenses and to raise awareness of the important role these animals play in the lives of their handlers.

"National Service Dog Month provides an opportunity to raise awareness about the incredible contributions of service dogs and celebrate the profound bond between service dogs and the individuals they serve," Carrier said, reading from the proclamation.



The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

Sept. 4, 1862 — On this day, Dover lost one of its most prominent public figures, Col. Andrew Peirce, who died at age 77. Born in Portsmouth in 1785, Peirce spent nearly his entire life in Dover, where he became a central figure in civic, political, religious, and financial life. Peirce's career spanned decades of public service. He was Speaker of the New Hampshire Legislature in 1823 and later served as state senator for the 5th District. In 1850, he was a delegate to the convention tasked with revising the state constitution. When Dover was incorporated as a city in 1855, residents honored his long record of service by electing him the city's first mayor. Beyond politics, Peirce played key roles in Dover's institutions. He worked as clerk of the Strafford County courts for 18 years, and also served as both cashier and president of the Dover Bank during the city's early years of industrial growth. Within his church, the First Congregational, he was a deacon for more than two decades, remembered for his faith and commitment to community. His public service stretched back to the War of 1812, when, as captain of a local militia, he led his company to Portsmouth during a threat to the city's harbor. At the time, coastal New England feared British attack, and volunteers like Peirce helped defend the region.

Sept. 3, 1864 — One of its oldest citizens, Michael Read, died on this day at the age of 86. A lifelong resident, Read was considered by many to be the town's living memory. Deeply engaged in Dover's local affairs, he had witnessed the city's transformation from a small colonial town into a bustling industrial community. Read's recollections stretched

back to the late 18th century. As a boy, he listened to the sermons of Rev. Jeremy Belknap, the noted historian and minister who served in Dover until 1786. He remembered watching the public execution of Elisha Thomas in 1788, and later attended sessions of the New Hampshire General Court when it convened in Dover's old courthouse in 1793. His memories painted a vivid picture of early Dover. He recalled a time when Dover Landing, later the heart of the city's waterfront, was still a common field, partially covered with trees. He remembered Franklin Square dominated by the stately "great house" of the Waldron family, whose holdings once stretched across much of central Dover, while the Coffin family controlled the land surrounding Cochecho Falls. By the end of his life, Read had seen Dover grow from a village with only a handful of houses into a thriving industrial city, driven by the mills and shipbuilding along the Cochecho. His long life and firsthand knowledge connected multiple generations to Dover's earliest days, and his passing marked the loss of a direct link to the town's colonial and revolutionary past.

Sept. 3, 1911 — Over 400 cars crossed the Dover Point Toll Bridge on this day, setting a new record. The bridge, which linked Dover and Newington, had been built in 1874. In 1918, half the bridge was swept away by a large sheet of ice. The bridge was replaced by the General Sullivan Bridge in 1934.

Sept. 2, 1996 – On Labor Day, members of the Dover Rotary Club braved the rain to plant more than 230 chrysanthemums and shrubs at Henry Law Park, continuing an ongoing beautification project. The effort, supported by \$25,000 in Rotary funds, created a brick flower bed in the shape of the Rotary wheel, along with new paved walkways, granite benches, lighting, and a wrought-iron fence overlooking the park. Rotary leaders pledged to maintain the gardens, ensuring their lasting presence. Nearly three decades later, the Rotary's commitment continues. This year, in May 2025, club members once again refreshed the Rotary Gardens, funding over \$3,000 in flowers and hardscape updates. Local businesses and volunteers contributed labor, materials, and expertise, from restoring granite markers to redesigning plant layouts. Today, the Rotary Gardens continue to brighten Henry Law Park, welcoming families, festival-goers, and visitors throughout the year, just as Dover Rotarians envisioned when they laid the first bricks in 1996.

Sept. 6, 2012 — Volunteers and trustees at the Woodman Museum carefully hoisted a 13½-foot Merry Mac sailboat into the Carriage House, adding a new piece of Dover history to the collection. The Merry Mac was designed by Dover native Ned McIntosh, who began building the boats in 1953 with his brother, David "Bud" McIntosh, after a friendly dare. Over six decades, more than 1,000 of the wooden vessels were produced. The restored "Boat No. 23" became the centerpiece of a planned nautical exhibit, which also included displays on ice harvesting. The Woodman Museum is open Wednesday through Sunday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Sept. 5 event to demonstrate how to rejuvenate root-bound street trees

A community demonstration to help rejuvenate a stressed downtown maple tree will take place Friday, Sept. 5, at 1 p.m. at the Joe B. Parks Riverwalk Public Gardens, 400 Central Ave.

Planted during the 1970s urban renewal of Dover's downtown core, the tree has become root-bound within the hardscape and is showing signs of stress. Susan Hamilton, ISA Certified Arborist and founder of Port City Tree Care, is donating her time and expertise for the project.

Using an Air Spade, Hamilton will methodically remove excess soil, expose the trunk root flare, relieve soil compaction, improve aeration and encourage optimal root development while minimizing the formation of girdling roots.

The event is free and open to the public.

In addition to Port City Tree Care, the event is also supported by the University of New Hampshire Extension, the City of Dover, and the Strafford County Master Gardeners Association.
