Coming up at the next City Council meeting

Teachers contract, local emergency operations plan on Council agenda

The City Council will consider approving the Dover Teachers' Union collective bargaining agreement and adopting the city's local emergency operations plan at its Wednesday, Aug. 12, 2026 meeting. [View the posted agenda.](#)

The School Board [approved](#) the 1-year DTU contract at its July 13, 2026 meeting, during which Superintendent Christine Boston said the agreement would allow the staggering of future bargaining contracts rather than all occurring in the same year. The School Board has already begun negotiations with the DTU for a 3-year contract covering the 2028 fiscal year. The pending DTU agreement would be in effect from July 1, 2026 to June 30, 2027.

Following the [Aug. 5 workshop](#) this week on the topic, the City Council will consider the approval and adoption of the City of Dover's Local Emergency Operations Plan (LEOP). The plan provides a scalable system for coordinating city departments, mutual aid partners, community organizations, and available resources during natural, human-caused, technological, public health, and other emergency incidents. This plan is intended to support the protection of life and property, the continuity of essential services, effective public information, resource coordination, and a timely transition from response to recovery, according to the background materials.

The City Council will also consider authorizing the award of the contract for Littleworth Road water and sewer improvements to GVC Construction, Inc., of Lunenburg, Massachusetts, in the amount of \$2,762,845. This project would include installing a new water main, services, and hydrants on Littleworth Road from Columbus Avenue to Old Littleworth Road and along Old Littleworth Road; installing a new sanitary sewer system and service on Old Littleworth Road, from Littleworth Road to Chandler Way; and the reclamation and paving of Old Littleworth Road.

At the beginning of the meeting, the City Council will hold two public hearings on pending resolutions. One is on the agreement of payment in lieu of taxes for a solar power generation facility on Crosby Road. The other is for the acceptance and expenditure of a New Hampshire Office of Highway Safety Grant.

Also [on the agenda](#) are pending resolutions that would approve or authorize:

- A lease renewal with New Hampshire Fish and Game for public access of Barbadoes Pond
- Lot restoration at 3 Beech Road
- The purchase of library books and media
- Awarding the bid for ADA door installation at the indoor pool and ice rinks
- Purchase of a Bobcat compact track loader

The meeting will be televised on DoverTV (Xfinity channel 22 and Breezeline channel 9010). It will also be broadcast on the city's new [streaming platform](#).

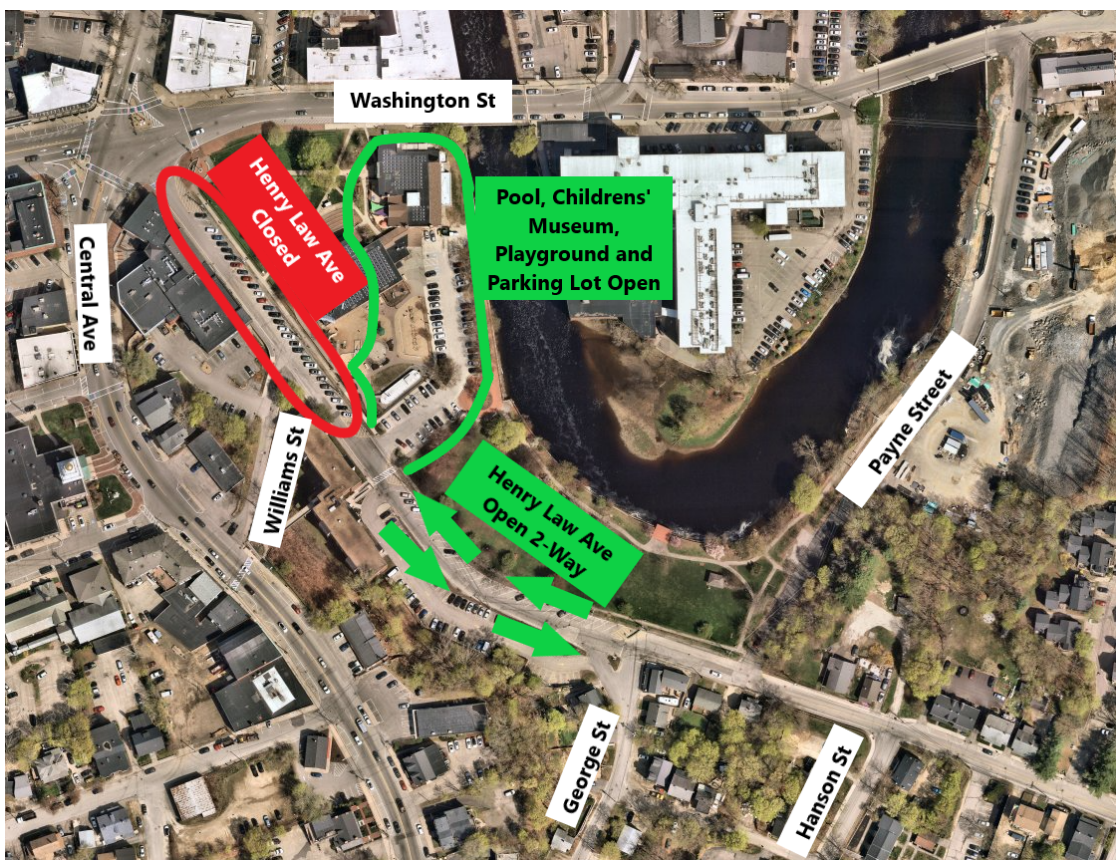

Henry Law reconstruction project begins Monday

Henry Law Avenue to be closed from Washington Street to Indoor Pool lot

Pool, Children's Museum and parking lot remain open

The first phase of the Henry Law Avenue and Payne Street Reconstruction Project begins on Monday, Aug. 10.

The first phase will include closing Henry Law Avenue from Washington Street to the public parking lot for the Dover Indoor Pool, Adventure Playground and the New Hampshire Children's Museum. The parking lot, pool and museum remain open during construction.

Henry Law Avenue will temporarily become a two-way street between George Street and the public parking lot. All parking spaces on Henry Law Avenue will be temporarily eliminated during the first phase.

Williams Street will be closed to through traffic.

The project will be completed in three phases. The first two phases include underground utility work on Henry Law Avenue, Payne Street, and Henry Law Park, as well as street reconstructions on Henry Law Avenue and Payne Street. The last phase of the project will impact Washington Street by the lower square.

Central Avenue traffic impacted next week

The right lane of Central Avenue northbound at the Washington Street and Henry Law Avenue intersection will be closed on Tuesday, Aug. 11 to allow the contractor to complete needed underground utility work. The left northbound lane will remain open. Flaggers will be on hand to assist with traffic, but motorists should anticipate delays through the area.

Smoke testing to identify inflow/infiltration areas of sewer system begins this month

A city contractor will conduct smoke testing in sections of the city in effort to identify areas of [inflow and infiltration](#) of stormwater into the sanitary sewer system. The work is anticipated to occur the week of August 17, weather permitting.

Properties in the affected areas will receive a door hanger alerting them of the smoke testing with contact information. Testing will occur within 1-4 business days of receiving the notice.

Smoke will not enter homes unless there is defective plumbing or dried up plumbing traps. Those who receive the notice are encouraged to dump a gallon of water in plumbing drains, especially those that don't get used often. Defective plumbing may indicate sewer gasses are also entering the building.

When smoke testing occurs, the contractor, Wright-Pierce, will blow non-toxic smoke through a sewer maintenance hole into the sewer pipes. This smoke is similar to what may be used at concerts and theater performances. The field crew then observes where smoke may exit the system. The exiting smoke may indicate that drain maintenance holes, catch basins, roof gutters and/or foundation drains are connected to the sewer system. smoke testing identifies issues for repair, improving the overall efficiency of the sewer system.

The goal of the work is to reduce rain water from entering the sewer system. The work is necessary both for federal and state compliance, as well as ensuring the health and vitality of natural resources like the Great Bay Estuary.

Deadline to order bricks to be installed by Veterans Day is Aug. 21

The Recreation Department will order another round of engraved bricks for Dover Veterans Park to be added in time for Veterans Day on Nov. 11. The deadline to include bricks in that order is Wednesday, Aug. 21, 2026.

Orders collected after the deadline, through Feb. 28, 2027, will be sent in the next batch for installation in the park by Memorial Day. The cost is \$100 for an 8-inch-by-8-inch brick and \$50 for a 4-inch-by-8-inch brick. The only requirement to have a name engraved is for the person to be a veteran. All bricks are engraved consistently with a full name, military rank and branch, and years of service and/or conflict. Upon request, bricks may also be grouped by family or service time.

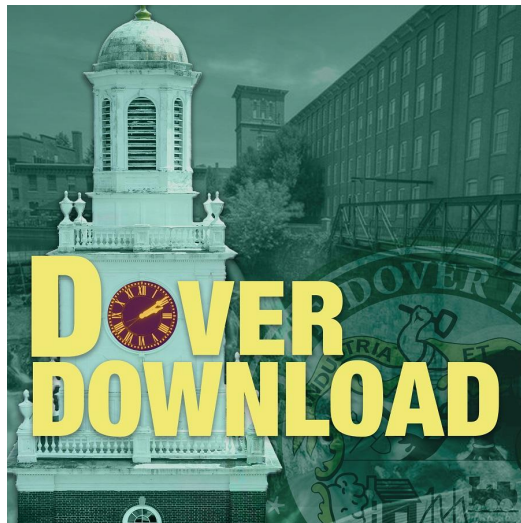

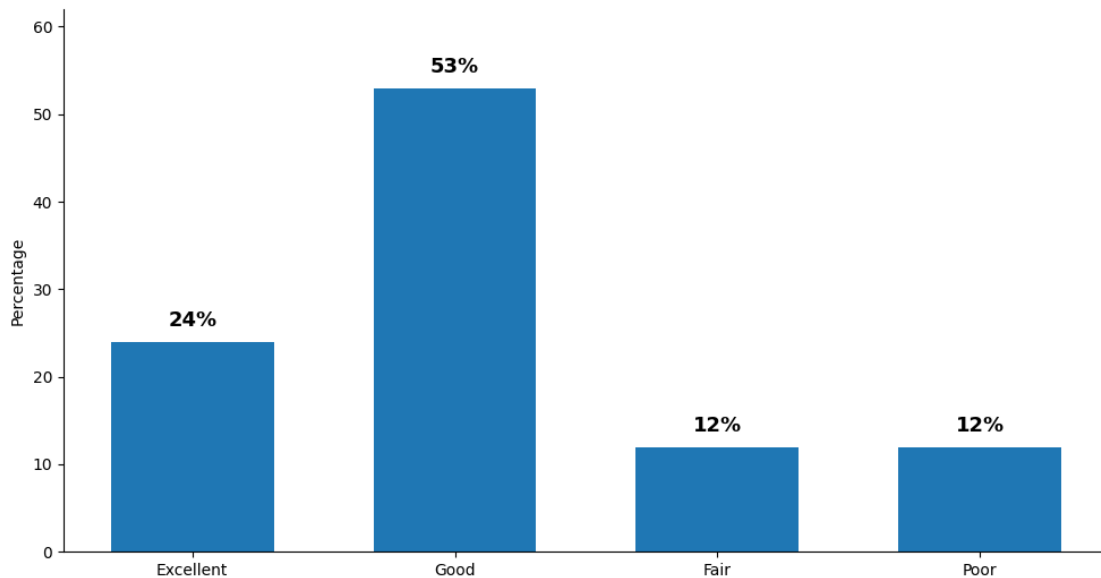

The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

Aug. 12, 1792 — A prolonged drought threatened Dover's crops before a powerful thunderstorm finally brought rain to the area. According to the Dover Phoenix, the region had received almost no meaningful rainfall for about four weeks, creating what the newspaper described as one of the worst droughts ever known in the county. The dry spell ended the previous Sunday evening when a severe storm brought heavy thunder, intense lightning and a refreshing downpour. Lightning reportedly struck in several places around Dover, although no damage had been reported when the account was published. The rain offered some relief, but residents feared that corn growing in the driest fields had already been damaged beyond recovery.

Aug. 7, 1826 — A powerful thunderstorm brought a series of lightning strikes across Dover, damaging two homes and a barn. The house of Moses Hodgdon on Silver Street was struck after lightning first hit a large sycamore tree in front of the property. The force of the strike tore bark from the tree's trunk, while part of the electrical charge traveled along a branch and entered the house. At nearly the same moment, lightning struck the home of John Evans, about 800 feet away. A man inside was knocked to the floor but recovered within several minutes. The storm also struck and seriously damaged a barn belonging to Benjamin Kielle, about 2½ miles from the village center. Despite the widespread damage, the newspaper account reported no deaths.

Aug. 11, 1826 — Weeks of heavy rain and flooding damaged bridges, dams and crops throughout the Dover area. The wet period began with intense rainfall that caused freshets — sudden rises in rivers and streams—to wash away dams and bridges and inflict considerable damage on farmland. During the 35 days between Aug. 11 and Sept. 14, rain fell on 17 days. The persistent dampness affected nearly every part of daily life. The New Hampshire Republican reported that mold and rust were spreading through homes, while

stored hay, garden vegetables and potatoes in the fields were rotting. For Dover's farmers, the unusually wet weather could be as destructive as a drought. Hay needed to remain dry to feed livestock through the winter, while potatoes and other crops were essential sources of food and income. Flood damage to roads and bridges could also isolate farms and disrupt travel and trade. Dams were particularly important in early 19th-century Dover because they controlled the water that powered mills along local rivers and streams.

Aug. 14, 1863 — Dover drafted 152 men to help replenish New Hampshire regiments depleted by the Civil War. The City Council approved a payment of \$300 to each drafted man—or to a substitute serving in his place—10 days after he was formally mustered into the United States military. When news of the draft became public, Dover's conscripts gathered outside City Hall. Accompanied by music and carrying torches, they marched through the city's principal streets. A contemporary account described the procession as a display of great enthusiasm and good feeling. The draft came under the Enrollment Act of 1863, the nation's first federal conscription law. It generally made male citizens and immigrants who had applied for citizenship between the ages of 20 and 45 eligible for military service. A drafted man could serve, hire a substitute or pay the federal government a \$300 commutation fee to avoid that particular draft. The substitution and commutation provisions were widely criticized because they appeared to give wealthier men an advantage. Dover's payment should not be confused with that federal commutation fee. The city offered the money after a man or his substitute had entered military service, making it a local financial incentive for filling Dover's obligation under the draft. The call came only weeks after the Battle of Gettysburg, where several New Hampshire regiments had fought during three days of intense combat. The need for replacements reflected the continuing losses suffered by Union units as the war entered its third year.

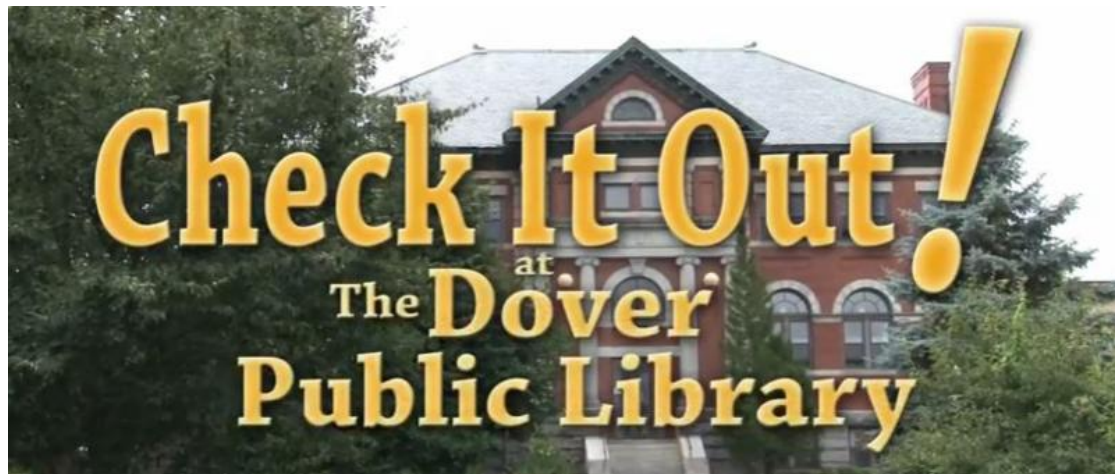

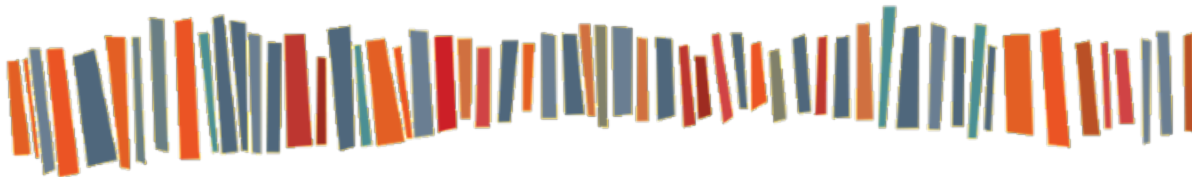

City of Dover to hold Household Hazardous Waste Day Oct. 17

The City of Dover, along with the towns of Rollinsford, Lee and Madbury, will hold a Hazardous Waste Collection Day on Saturday, Oct. 17, 2026, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., at the City's Community Services facility, 271 Mast Road.

The goal of Hazardous Waste Collection Day is to allow for the proper disposal of household hazardous materials. Residents of the four communities can bring household hazardous waste to Community Services for safe disposal.

The following household waste will be accepted: fertilizer with acids; bathroom cleaners; brush cleaner; pesticides; car waxes/polish; disinfectants; corrosives; fungicides; creosote; furniture polish paint/stain/finish; insect spray; driveway sealers/tar; metal polish (lead and oil-based); lighter fluid; flea powder; mothballs; rust preventatives; pest strips/traps; gasoline; oven cleaners; solvents; pesticides; radiator flush; photo chemicals; thinner/turpentine; poisons; roofing tar; rug cleaner; wood preservatives; pool chemicals; and wood strippers. Empty containers are not hazardous. Please dispose of them in your regular trash.

Explosives, asbestos, batteries, fluorescent bulbs, propane tanks, latex paint, waste oil and antifreeze will not be accepted.

Hazardous Waste Collection Day is for residents only. Proof of residency is required.

Red Cross declares emergency blood shortage

The American Red Cross is declaring an emergency blood shortage as the blood supply fell nearly 25% in June. Blood donors are urgently needed to give now to help ensure patients receive lifesaving medical care without delay.

The shortage comes during the height of trauma season, when hospitals frequently see increased demand for blood due to serious injuries and other medical emergencies, according to the Red Cross.

A steep decline in blood donations since the end of May has created a growing gap between supply and patient need. Currently, Red Cross distributions to hospitals are nearly 3,500 units higher per week than expected. The shortage is especially serious for types O positive and B negative blood. Blood donors are urgently needed to give now to help ensure patients receive lifesaving medical care without delay.
