City Council, School Board hold joint workshop on budget development, tax cap

The City Council and School Board will meet jointly on Wednesday, Dec. 7, to discuss the development of the fiscal year 2024 budget and receive a preliminary calculation of the FY2024 tax cap.

The tax cap is calculated annually, as the city's charter requires. "The City Council shall adopt the annual municipal budget for city and school purposes to limit the property tax levy on taxpayers to the property tax levy from the previous tax year increased by the amount of inflation calculated from the Consumer Price Index-Boston and the net increase in new construction," the charter states in Limitation on Property Tax Levy Increase, with inflation calculated on the last three years of CPI data. The charter allows the tax cap to be overridden by a two-thirds majority vote of all elected City Council members.

The workshop will also include a discussion of the teacher salary benchmark survey. The School Board and City Council approved the Dover Tecahers' Union one-year contract in September. During the adoption of the FY2023 budget, the City Council requested the School Department conduct a wage study.

The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. in Room 305 at the McConnell

Center. It will be televised live on Channel 22 and online at <u>dovernh.viebit.com</u>, where it will also be available for on-demand viewing.

School Board budget review continues

The School Board will hold its second budget workshop on Monday, Dec. 5, at 6 p.m. in the McConnell Center's School Board Chambers, Room 306.

Last week, the School Board heard from department heads on the need for the new positions they proposed for the fiscal year 2024 budget. At its Nov. 14 meeting, the School Board received its preliminary budget from Superintendent William Harbron and Business Administrator Michael Limanni.

City unveils land acknowledgment plaque

On Monday, Nov. 28, the City of Dover unveiled a replica of a bronze plaque

bearing a land acknowledgment to the area's indigenous peoples. The ceremony, held at the Dover Public Library, was attended by city officials, members of the indigenous community, and members of the Racial Equity and Inclusion Committee.



The bronze plaques are made possible thanks to a generous grant by the New Hampshire Humanities Council. They will be installed at city facilities.

The unveiling was followed by a <u>special presentation on indigenous land stewardship</u>, with guest speakers Paul and Denise Pouliot, the Sag8mo and Sag8moskwa (Male and Female Head Speakers) of the Cowasuck Band of the Pennacook Abenaki People; and Kathleen Blake, affiliate faculty of the University of New Hampshire Native American and Indigenous Studies Minor. The New Hampshire Humanities Council grant, which was approved by the City Council earlier this year, helped create Indigenous Dover, an initiative to help better understand and appreciate the history of the indigenous peoples who were here in what is now called Dover, thousands of years before the first European settlers.

The City Council adopted a land acknowledgment last year, which had been proposed by the Council's ad-hoc Committee on Racial Equity and Inclusion (CREI). Dover's land acknowledgment at city facilities will state: *"This facility is located at Cochecho (CO-chi-co) within N'dakinna (n-DA-ki-na), now called Dover, New Hampshire, which is the unceded traditional ancestral homeland of the Abenaki (a-BEN-a-ki), Pennacook and Wabanaki Peoples, past and present. We acknowledge and honor with gratitude the land, waterways, living beings, and the Aln8bak (Al-nuh-bak), the people who have stewarded N'dakinna (n-DA-ki-na) for many millennia."*

Strafford County Delegation to hold public hearing, vote on new nursing home bond

The Strafford County Legislative Delegation is scheduled to meet Monday, Dec. 5, and hold a public hearing and vote on the Strafford County Commissioners' proposal to build a new nursing home and fund construction through \$150 million in bonds.

The bonding request is \$20 million less than initially proposed for a vote on Sept. 6. The meeting was to be rescheduled to "gather additional information." The project was also reduced in scope, according to a legislative delegation workshop session held Nov. 30.

Strafford County Commissioner Chair George Maglaras told the Dover City Council in August that if a new nursing facility was built, the commissioners' goal is to turn the current nursing facility into a transitional shelter for the unhoused.

The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. in Courtroom II of the Strafford County Superior Court, 259 County Farm Road in Dover. Public access will also be available online via Zoom. <u>Click here</u> for the complete agenda and online access instructions.

The Strafford County Legislative Delegation comprises Strafford County's state representatives and is responsible for appropriating funds to operate the county.

Emergency water restrictions lifted

Effective Nov. 29, City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr., rescinded the mandatory, citywide ban on outdoor water use <u>implemented</u> on Aug. 22, 2022.

While there are no longer water-use restrictions, Joyal encourages residents and businesses to continue with voluntary water conservation measures. "We are still in need of additional precipitation to allow our aquifers to fully recover from [...] the impact created by the Pudding Hill Aquifer being offline and the drought conditions experienced over the past few months," he wrote in an email to the City Council announcing the ending of the water ban.

There are several ways users can help conserve water, including:

- Cutting back on shower times, only doing full loads of laundry when necessary, and turning off the faucet while brushing teeth, doing dishes and washing hands.
- Replace old water fixtures and appliances that are wasting water. Top-loading washing machines built before 2003 and toilets older than 1994 are known to be the largest water-wasting culprits in the home. Showerheads older than 1994 can also waste a lot of water, as can older bathroom sink aerators. Selecting ENERGY STAR certified machines and replacing old water fixtures with EPA WaterSense certified fixtures is an easy way to ensure these products that will be water and energy efficient.
- Fix leaks, including running toilets. Running toilets can waste hundreds of gallons a day. Old and worn toilet flappers are often the culprit and are very easy to replace. Also, some toilet leaks can't be heard. Check for a leak by dropping food coloring (12 drops) or a leak detector dye tablet in the toilet tank. Do not flush for 15 or 20 minutes. If the dye shows up in the bowl, you know that your toilet is running.

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information <u>located here</u>.

Dec. 8, 1811 — Died, Mr. Samuel Bragg, Jr., editor and printer of the Dover Sun. "In the death of Mr. Bragg the town of Dover has experienced a great loss. He was a very industrious and enterprising man of steady habits and attention to his business. He had by his assiduity and great diligence acquired a very handsome property, when about twelve months since, while absent on a journey he was in a moment stripped of almost every dollar by the all-devouring element of fire. This disaster took such hold of his mind, as, after a while, to produce a dejection of spirits, and invite a complication of disorders which has thus early put a period to his mortal existence."

Dec. 8, 1837 — The Universalist Church on Third Street, built this year, was dedicated on this day.

Dec. 2, 1860 — The First Congregational Chapel on Central Street, built this year, was dedicated on this day.

Dec. 6, 1996 — The Governor's Office of Energy and Community Services reports that heating oil prices had risen by 27 cents over the previous year. In Dover, the average was reported to be \$1.35 a gallon.

Dec. 8, 2003 — The Dover School Board approved a \$7,500 feasibility study to explore adding two classroom wing additions at Woodman Park School.

The second annual Mental Health, Wellness and Recovery in the Workplace Summit, underwritten by Kennebunk Savings and sponsored by Harvard Pilgrim Health Care and Granite United Way, will take place Thursday, Dec. 8 at the McConnell Center Cafeteria in Dover from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m.
