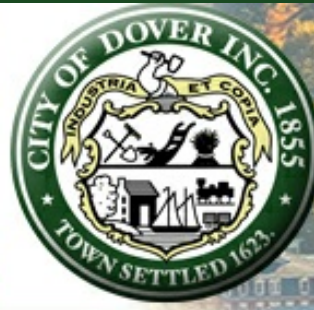

## City of Dover to measure carbon and nitrogen footprints

The City of Dover's Planning and Community Development Department was recently selected by the University of New Hampshire (UNH) Sustainability Institute to host a Summer Sustainability Fellow in 2018. The Department proposed a project in which the fellow will measure the carbon and nitrogen footprints of the City's municipal operations, including school operations.

UNH Sustainability Fellowships pair outstanding graduate and undergraduate students with competitive, challenging, multi-disciplinary projects based with organizations and communities across New England. During the 10-week fellowship, the fellow selected to work with the City of Dover will utilize a tool developed by UNH, the Sustainability Indicator Management and Analysis Platform (SIMAP). SIMAP calculates the direct and indirect emissions of carbon and nitrogen created by city and school operations, such as maintaining a fleet of vehicles, heating and cooling facilities, lighting streets and traffic signals, feeding students, running public water wells, and treating wastewater before it enters the Piscataqua River.

The selected fellow will also begin to adapt the SIMAP program, which was designed for use by university campuses, to apply to municipalities as well. The project will result in a final report and presentation with recommendations for reducing the City's production of each pollutant.

A carbon footprint considers both carbon dioxide and methane emissions that are released into the atmosphere through many activities, including the production and consumption of food, fuels, manufactured goods, materials, roads, buildings, transportation and other services. A nitrogen footprint estimates the reactive nitrogen produced as a byproduct of burning fossil fuels or resulting from the production and waste of food, fertilizer use, and human and animal waste.

Assistant City Planner Elena Piekut and the Dover Energy Commission, which serves in an advisory capacity to the City Council, will mentor the fellow. The Energy Commission has long sought to gather baseline data on the energy use of each of the City's facilities.

"The Energy Commission is very grateful for this opportunity, since they've been looking at options to do something similar for several months," Piekut said. "The SIMAP tool goes above and beyond other platforms they reviewed, and having an expert dedicated to the data collection and analysis is key. The nitrogen aspect is also very exciting. UNH is ahead of the curve in providing this type of analysis, and few if any municipalities have calculated a nitrogen footprint. We are a pilot project."

This project furthers many goals identified in the City's Master Plan, the guiding document for planning efforts and policies. Goals established throughout the chapters of the Master Plan consider becoming a community that can sustain itself and provide a high quality of life for generations, protecting and conserving its natural resources, including water quality, and maintaining infrastructure that supports many modes of transportation. A specific objective of the Stewardship of Resources Chapter of the Master Plan is to "identify and adopt a carbon limit and specific reduction strategies for City buildings and vehicles."

With the help of a Summer Sustainability Fellow, the City will do that and more.

According to Christopher Parker, AICP, Dover's Assistant City Manager, who oversees planning activities, "In Dover, the Master Plan isn't just a report we complete, shelve and admire, it is a document we live, and grow with. This project is an example of the community embracing the Stewardship Chapter and its recommendations."

Like Piekut, Parker is excited to see this project move

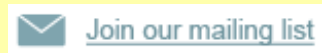
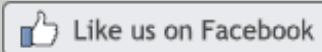

## Community Trail committee seeks volunteers for mural

## Climate Adaptation chapter of Master Plan topic of public hearing

The Planning Board will hold a public hearing on the proposed Climate Adaptation chapter of the Dover Master Plan on Tuesday, Feb. 27, 2018 at 7 p.m., at City Hall. This follows a Jan. 9 Planning Board workshop to review the recently completed chapter.

The Climate Adaptation chapter of the Master Plan addresses Dover's water availability and quality, health and safety, food, energy, infrastructure and natural resources.

In February 2017, the City adopted a Stewardship of Resources chapter of the Master Plan, which called for the creation and adoption of a climate resilience chapter. The Climate Adaptation chapter will serve that purpose.

Development of the Climate Adaptation chapter began in late 2017 with a steering committee of citizen volunteers and staff from the City, Strafford Regional Planning Commission, University of New Hampshire Cooperative Extension and New Hampshire Sea Grant. The process has included numerous steering committee meetings and various public outreach and engagement efforts.

"The City of Dover has been on the forefront of addressing climate change from a municipal perspective," said City Planner Steve Bird. "The development of this chapter is the next logical step to continuing the City's efforts to be proactive in addressing potential impacts from climate change."

## Waterfront blasting operations ongoing through March 15

Crews from Severino Trucking Company and Maine Drilling and Blasting will continue blasting operations on Dover's waterfront development site through March 15, 2018. Blasting is scheduled Monday through Friday between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m., and will consist of a single blast each day. The remainder of work each day will consist of removing material.

The blasting site is the area known as "the bluff," a steep area of ledge that borders River Street. The ledge is being excavated as part of the City's waterfront development project. Blasting began on Jan. 22.

Although blasting operations are not loud, the ground within the vicinity of the blasting may tremble.

Prior to blasting, abutters within 1,000 feet of the work were notified of blasting operations. Public abutter meetings about the blasting were held on Nov 1 and Dec. 22. Abutters were offered the opportunity to have Maine Drilling and Blasting conduct a preblast survey of their property.

The five-acre bluff is part of the City's 12-acre waterfront parcel slated for development. The bluff's 3.7 acres of ledge will be excavated to street level to allow for more buildable land. The Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee, which oversees the project, approved a concept plan last year that calls for 226 residential units, 9,000 square feet of commercial space and a 4,000-square-foot restaurant on the City owned waterfront property. The committee recently completed a request for qualifications from developers interested in the property.

Severino began preparing the bluff for excavation in December 2017 by removing trees and stumps. Severino

expects to remove 62,000 cubic yards of rock from the excavation.

## Applications for "All Veterans" tax credit due by April 15

Veterans who qualify for the newly adopted All Veterans' Tax Credit must complete an application by April 15. The Dover City Council adopted the All Veterans' Tax Credit on Nov. 8, 2017, following a revision to state law that allows municipalities to extend tax credits to all veterans who have served at least 90 days and honorably discharged from the military.

According to the law, "A person shall qualify for the all veterans' tax credit if the person is a resident of this state who served not less than 90 days on active service in the armed forces of the United States and was honorably discharged or an officer honorably separated from service; or the spouse or surviving spouse of such resident, provided that Title 10 training for active duty by a member of a national guard or reserve shall be included as service under this paragraph; provided however that the person is not eligible for and is not receiving a credit under RSA 72:28 or RSA 72:35. "

The All Veterans' Tax Credit will be phased in over a period of three years to match the existing veterans' credit of \$500. For veterans who qualify for the All Veterans' Tax Credit, but didn't previously qualify for the existing veterans' credit because they didn't serve during a designated timeframe for a qualifying war or armed conflict, the credit will be phased in over a period of three years.

For 2018 the credit will be \$167. The 2019 credit will be \$333. The 2020 credit will be for the full amount of \$500.

The tax credit will be subtracted each year from the property tax on a qualifying veteran's residential property.

An application for the All Veterans' credit must be made prior to April 15 during the current tax year.

The group will gather at Beckwith Park on Hillside Drive at 6:30 p.m.

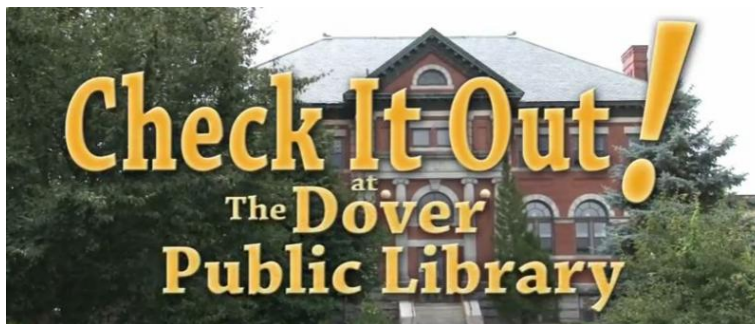
The hike is a leisurely, one-and-a-half-hour hike along the Cochecho Rover and through fields, returning to the Beckwith park where hot cocoa will be served.

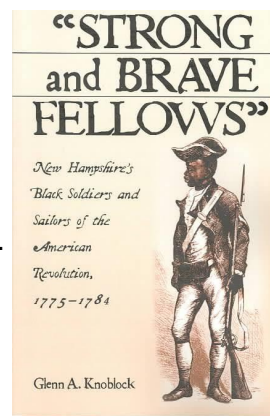

## History of NH's African-American Soldiers in the American Revolution at the Dover Public Library Feb. 20



In honor of Black History Month, the Friends of the Library are pleased to welcome Glenn Knoblock for a program entitled "Strong and Brave Fellows: A History of NH's Black Soldiers and Sailors of the American Revolution" on Tuesday evening, Feb. 20 at 7 p.m.



One of the most interesting aspects of the American Revolution is the role played by African Americans in the fight for independence. Both free African Americans and those that were enslaved were key in manning state militias and Continental Army units, as well as serving on the high seas in the Navy and on privately armed ships. Indeed, their service to the colonies was crucial in a conflict that lasted nearly seven years. Prohibited from serving in military units and largely considered "undesirable elements," how is it that these black soldiers came to fight for the cause of liberty, even when their own personal liberty was not guaranteed?

Glenn Knoblock will examine the history of African-American soldiers' service during the war, including how and why they enlisted, their interaction with white soldiers, service on the battlefields, how they were perceived, both by the enemy and the officers under whom they served, and their treatment after the war.

Glenn Knoblock is an independent scholar and author of 15 books and over 100 articles. He has served as the historian on projects relating to northern New England bridges, New Hampshire cemeteries, brewing history, and African-American military history. Knoblock has served as the primary military contributor to Harvard and Oxford University's landmark African-American Biography Project. He holds a BA in History from Bowling Green State University.

**Feb. 17, 1696** - The Provincial Council having information that the bridge over Cochecho river was broken and gone, whereby relief to Heard's Garrison would be hindered in case of an attack from the enemy, ordered the Secretary to give notice to Capt. John Woodman, Capt. John Tuttle and the Selectmen of Dover that they with all convenient speed call the inhabitants of the town together and make a sufficient bridge over the same.



**Feb. 17, 1824** - Notice was given that the Savings Bank for the County of Strafford, in Dover, was organized and ready to receive deposits.



**Feb. 22, 1855** - The Piscataqua Bridge became impassable and its use was discontinued, about 500 feet of it being carried away by the ice.



**Feb. 17, 1856** - Another severe snow storm occurred at this time, blocking up travel so effectually that no trains reached Dover on any railroad for four days.



**Feb. 22, 1865** - The bells of the city were rung and a grand salute fired in commemoration of the fall of Charleston, S. C. and the rehoisting of the flag of the Union upon Fort Sumter.

## Time to renew dog licenses

Dog licenses for 2018 are now available. All dogs must be licensed by April 30 to avoid a late fee. The cost for a male or female dog is \$10, a neutered male or spayed female dog is \$7.50 and puppies (3-7 months) are \$7.50 for first licensing.

Residents 65 years of age or older may license one dog for \$3. Additional licenses require regular fees.

The City Clerk's office requires proof of rabies information and a certificate of spaying or neutering.

Late fees of \$1 a month begin June 1.

Dog licenses can be renewed at the City Clerk's office at City Hall, by mail or online.

In addition to online licensing, rabies information can also be updated online and the certificate mailed to the City Clerk's office. A checking account is required for online dog license registration. To ensure privacy, dog owners must provide the dog's tag number.
