City Council gets first look at proposed FY2024 budget

City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. presented the proposed fiscal year 2024 budget to the City Council on Wednesday, Feb. 15, 2023, during a <u>special meeting</u>. The presentation kicked off several weeks of budget meetings, workshops and public hearings.

webpage. Other budget meetings and presentations will also be posted to this page as they occur as well as budget documents and other information.

The total proposed FY2024 budget totals \$183,821,915, an increase of \$4,125,089, or 2.3%. That figure includes all funds, including special revenue funds and proprietary funds. The total general fund totals \$146,705,670, an increase of \$6,930,771, or 5%. As proposed, the budget exceeds the estimated tax cap by \$483,092, and would require a two-thirds majority vote of the City Council to adopt.

Coming up at the next City Council meeting

Outdoor dining permits, Racial Equity committee status on Council agenda

At the City Council's Wednesday, Feb. 22, meeting, the City Council will hold public hearings, followed by votes on pending resolutions that would:

- Create a permanent permit process to allow restaurants to have outdoor dining on public streets and sidewalks. There are two public hearings and resolutions associated with this change for modifying chapters 85 and 125 of the city's code;
- Change the Ad-Hoc Committee for Racial Equity and Inclusion from an ad-hoc to a standing committee;
- Expand the number of alternates for the Energy Commission from two to four.

The Council will also hold its second of two public hearings on the pending resolution to authorize the city's annual real estate appraisal for fiscal year 2024 (tax year 2023), with a vote to occur at the Council's March 8 meeting. The city's assessing practice has been to analyze and reassess all sections and classifications of properties annually to keep all assessments proportional and within a market level of 90% to 110%. To maintain market level and proportionality of assessments, city staff foresee that an assessment update will be necessary. If the ratio studies completed next month determine that a full-market update is unnecessary, then a citywide assessment update will not occur.

Other City Council agenda items include:

- A resolution to authorize expenditures to SMP Architecture of Concord of up to \$361,145 for the second phase of the architectural evaluation of renovations and repairs of the Dover Public Library. The phase would be broken into two parts: addressing the replacement of the boilers and sprinkler system; and the multi-story addition and alterations throughout the facility.
- Authorize the city to continue contracting with Servpro, Inc., of Dover, on an as-needed basis for cleaning services for abandoned encampments. Before FY2022, these services were under \$5,000 annually, according to the agenda materials. Since 2022, there has been a substantial increase in the need for these services. In FY2022, the city spent \$10,525.00; to date in FY2023, the city has spent \$12,778 and anticipates exceeding \$25,000 this year.

Watch presentation on downtown access improvements

The Transportation Advisory Commission held a special meeting Monday for a public presentation on the Downtown Pedestrian and Vehicular Access Improvements Project.

In the presentation, project manager Mark Debowski of Greenman-Pederson, Inc., the contracted design consultant, gave an overview of preliminary design plans Greenman-Pederson created based on the 2015 Downtown Pedestrian and Vehicular Access and Streetscape Study. These designs and the 2015 report are available on the project page, www.dover.nh.gov/government/city-operations/planning/special-projects/downtown-access-plan/.

Debowski discussed current conditions in the Central Business District, the recommendation from the 2015 study to change the traffic flow on Central Avenue and Main Street, and why that change would be advantageous to pedestrians, motorists and downtown businesses. The benefits he cited included increased safety, clearer and more convenient traffic circulation,

direct access to business, residences and parking, simplified links to parking, expanded transit options, and eliminating the possibility of wrong-way travel on one-way roads.

Debowski highlighted parts of the design, including options to revamp the intersections of Lower Square, where Washington Street, Central Avenue and Henry Law Avenue meet, and Upper Square, where Main Street and Central Avenue intersect.

After the presentation, the public viewed the preliminary design plans at stations in the City Hall auditorium, asking questions to project team members and providing feedback.

The city and design consultant will select the preferred design option based on public feedback and begin creating final design plans. A second public meeting will be planned for spring/summer 2023 to review the revised plans before final construction bid documents are completed, expected by December 2023.

At the meeting, Deputy City Manager Christopher Parker said once the design is finalized, the project, anticipated to be implemented in phases, would be added to the six-year Capital Improvements Program, with work likely not starting until at least 2030.

Deadline to order Veterans Park bricks in time for Memorial Day is Feb. 28

The Recreation Department will order another round of engraved bricks for Dover Veterans Park to be added for Memorial Day on May 30. The deadline to have bricks included in that order is Tuesday, Feb. 28, at 4 p.m.

Orders collected after the deadline through Aug. 31, 2023, will be sent in the next batch to be installed in the park by Veterans Day. The cost is \$100 for an 8-inch by 8-inch brick and \$50 for a 4-inch by 8-inch brick. The only requirement to have a name engraved is for the person to be a veteran. All bricks are engraved consistently with a full name, military rank and branch, and years of service and/or conflict. Upon request, bricks may also be grouped by family or service time.

Collection of storm debris continues for additional week

Work will focus on current list of collection requests; no additional requests being accepted

Due to the high demand for storm-debris cleanup, the city's contracted arborist will extend its work into a third week. However, the city is no longer accepting service requests for curbside collection due to the backlog of work orders already submitted.

Crews are working to clear more than 500 service requests, reflecting 1,600 specific issues that have been listed since the beginning of February. The curbside collection is a one-time event to help clear the destruction of January's winter storm.

Community Services Director John Storer asks for the public's patience as crews work through service requests. Any work not completed by the arborist's crews will be completed by city crews as time allows.

Property owners and residents encouraged to bring storm debris to Recycling Center

Property owners and residents cleaning up their property are encouraged to bring storm debris to the Recycling Center on Mast Road; there is no charge to do so. The Recycling Center is open Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Trees and debris that fall on the city's rights of way remain the property of the property owner.

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information <u>located here</u>.


Feb. 22, 1754 — Petitions for a new parish in Dover, by the name of Somersworth, were presented again this year, and the Assembly appointed a committee "to take a view of such part of Dover as may be necessary in order to judge whether the prayer of the petition ought to be granted or not, and make report thereof as soon as may be, the petitioners to be at the cost and charge thereof."

Feb. 24, 1788 — A fight at a tavern in New Durham ends up in the fatal stabbing of Peter Drown by Elisha Thomas, a veteran of the Revolutionary War. Thomas was sent to the jail in Dover where he was hanged in June of that year. It was Dover's first hanging. To learn more, visit https://youtu.be/keUxml_PBO-w.

Feb. 22, 1855 — The Piscataqua Bridge became impassable after 500 feet of it was carried away by ice. The bridge would not be used again.

Feb. 23, 1917 — It is reported that the City of Dover's Street Department has spent \$129 per inch of snow in snow removal operations after a recent storm that dropped 10 inches of snow on the City.

Feb. 24, 2002 — McIntosh College, then located on Cataract Avenue, announced it would soon celebrate the opening of its new Academy of Design and Technology, located in the former Dover Bingo Center on Rutland Street. The academy would focus on visual communications and information technology. At the time of the announcement, about 1,000 students were enrolled at the school. The City Council had rezoned portions of Rutland and Fisher streets in 2001 to allow McIntosh College to expand its campus and programming. McIntosh College had also purchased the former Holiday Inn Express in 2001 for additional student housing. The college closed in 2009. The Silver Street campus, which included a culinary academy, was later redeveloped as Silver Square. Plans to develop the former campus on Cataract Avenue include four apartment buildings.

February vacation weeks bring bigger crowds to Children's Museum

The Children's Museum of New Hampshire is open for February vacation weeks, with special hours, but is still maintaining its capacity limit and requesting that visitors reserve their spots online prior to visiting. Local schools have their February break anywhere from Feb. 19 through March 5, and CMNH has added an extra Tuesday afternoon (1-4 p.m.) play session to their regular hours to help accommodate the crowds.

"We do get very busy these last two weeks of February," said CMNH Director Jane Bard. "We've discovered that our current capacity limits help create the best environment for all our visitors, and prevent kids and parents from being overwhelmed by crowds of over 500 people. But to help us stick to those limits, we really need our visitors' help, including all our members."

The museum has set each "play session" or three hour block at a capacity of 250 individuals. By reserving tickets early online it not only helps the museum plan for busier days, but also helps speed up check-in. It's easy for members to reserve their date and time in advance as well, and costs nothing.

"We understand families can't always make their plans to visit way in advance, and if you do end up making a last-minute decision to visit, we do have limited walk-up spaces available for each session, and if you arrive within the first thirty minutes of a session start, these are typically available for you to use," Bard said. "But it's still really important that they reserve because we do NOT want to have to turn anyone away."

And conversely if plans change, the museum asks people to notify them by emailing questions@childrens-museum.org so they can release those spots to other families.

The museum's vacation week hours are Tuesdays through Saturdays, 9 a.m. to noon or 1-4 p.m., and Sundays 9 a.m. to noon.

The museum is closed between play sessions. That time is used to give staff lunch breaks and reset and clean the exhibits. There are plenty of local restaurants within a short walk of the museum if families are looking for lunch, or Lickey's and Chewy's Candies and Creamery is right across the street for those looking for a sweet treat. Also right across from the museum is The Noggin Factory toy shop.

"Or if the weather is nice, there's the Dover Adventure Playground right next to the museum, which we helped design," Bard added.

During these vacation weeks, there will be drop-in STEAM building challenges and other drop-in activities available throughout the museum, but the weekly themed programs like Wacky Art Wednesdays or Baby Storytime, will be put on hold.

The weekly programs that are included with museum admission will resume Tuesday, March 7.

Ensuring accessibility to museum experiences for all is a central part of the museum's mission. 
