

Dover Energy Commission releases 2024 Energy Report

The Dover Energy Commission adopted the 2024 Energy Report at its Feb. 19 meeting.

The 15-page report highlights key energy initiatives and progress made during the 2024 calendar year. It includes an initial assessment of Dover's carbon footprint, an overview of energy savings performance contracts, details on the Wastewater Treatment Facility solar project, and highlights of other commission initiatives throughout the year.

The Dover Energy Commission advises the City of Dover through its boards and committees on ways to reduce energy use, develop alternative energy sources and increase economic security and energy independence. The goal of the Energy Commission is to promote and encourage energy conservation measures for Dover residents, businesses and municipal operations.

Dover Main Street honored for 25 years of service to community

Mayor Robert Carrier and the City Council recognized Dover Main Street for 25 years of service to the community during the Feb. 26 City Council meeting, presenting the organization with a proclamation celebrating its contributions to the city.

Dover Main Street board members, including Chair Gail Daudelin, attended the meeting to accept the honor.

"Dover Main Street continues to support other local organizations, including the Arts Commission, downtown merchants and restaurants, the Chamber of Commerce, and various community groups," the mayor said, reading from the proclamation.

The proclamation highlighted Dover Main Street's dedication to its mission of "Preserve the past, promote the present, and facilitate the future" since its founding in 1999. It noted numerous community initiatives, including the annual Clean Up Day, maintenance of 33 historical markers throughout the city, holiday events, the Run Before You Crawl 5K Race and Pub Crawl, and the annual Food Drive.

"The next event is the Run Before You Crawl and that kicks off March 8," Carrier remided everyone. "It's a great community event."

Dover Main Street, a completely volunteer-driven organization, has plans for several initiatives in 2025, Daudelin said at the meeting.

"We are a 100% volunteer group," Daudelin said. "We all have full-time jobs, and this is what we do because we love it. I also want to take time to thank all those who came before this group, who set the path that we're on, our volunteers who come out year after year, the community that supports us, and our sponsors who support our events and our mission."

Daudelin mentioned that Dover Main Street is redesigning its website and has 13 restaurants participating in the upcoming Run Before You Crawl event on March 8, which serves as the kickoff to the Dover Race Series.

The organization has been particularly active in community beautification through programs like Adopt-A-Spot and the annual Clean Up Day, which brings up to 250 volunteers together each spring.

Consumer Alert: AG, DOT warn of E-ZPass impersonation scam in NH

Attorney General John M. Formella and Transportation Commissioner William J. Cass are warning residents about a "smishing" scam targeting New Hampshire E-ZPass users. The scam involves fraudulent text messages claiming to be from E-ZPass that try to trick recipients into clicking malicious links and sharing personal information.

"Smishing" refers to fake text messages designed to deceive people into sharing personal data, downloading malware or making payments to scammers. These messages typically impersonate legitimate organizations and create a sense of urgency.

In this scam, recipients receive texts appearing to be from E-ZPass claiming their vehicle has an unpaid toll invoice. The message includes a link and threatens "excessive fees," "potential legal action" and "suspension of vehicle registration" if not paid promptly.

Any unsolicited text message, email or other communication from NH E-ZPass or ZDriveMA seeking payment for outstanding toll fees is a scam. NH E-ZPass and ZDriveMA never contact customers by text message to request payment.

Residents who receive such messages should:

- · Forward the suspicious message to 7726 (SPAM) to alert their mobile provider
- Delete the message
- Never respond or click embedded links

NH E-ZPass account holders can safely check their accounts through the official NH Turnpike E-ZPass website (<u>www.ezpassnh.com</u>) or the NH E-ZPass app available from the Apple App Store or Google Play store.

Recipients can file complaints with the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center, which shares information on internet crimes across law enforcement agencies.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information <u>located here</u>.

March 1, 1858 — Gen. Sam Houston, a former president of the Republic of Texas and U.S. senator, joined prominent newspaper editor Horace Greeley at a public meeting at Dover City Hall. The discussion focused on the lingering effects of the Mexican-American War and "the Texas question" — the controversial annexation of Texas by the United States in 1845, which had contributed to tensions between the U.S. and Mexico and further inflamed the national debate over slavery. Houston, known for his moderate stance on sectional conflicts, was an outspoken critic of Southern secession, while Greeley, the influential editor of the New-York Tribune, was a vocal opponent of slavery's expansion. Their visit to Dover reflected the growing national debate that would soon lead to the Civil War.


March 2, 1860 — Abraham Lincoln, a relatively unknown Republican presidential candidate from Illinois, delivered a nearly two-hour speech to the Republicans of Dover at City Hall, then located at the corner of Central Avenue and Washington Street. At the time, the nation was deeply divided over the issue of slavery, with tensions between Northern and Southern states continuing to escalate. Lincoln's speech was part of a broader effort to introduce himself to voters in the Northeast and solidify Republican opposition to the expansion of slavery into new territories. Just months later, Lincoln would secure the Republican nomination and go on to win the presidency in a contentious election that set the stage for the Civil War.

March 5, 1996 — The City of Dover began assessing three parcels of land for a new Public Works facility to replace its facility on River Street. The facility on River Street was to be relocated in anticipation of the development of the city-owned waterfront property. The City eventually decided to construct the new facility on Mast Road, where it remains today.

March 4, 1999 — Dover City Councilors join with the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce to support Dover's designation as a Main Street community, a program launched by the National Trust for Historic Preservation to help revitalize downtowns and

commercial districts. With a budget drafted by the Dover Chamber that outlined the operation of Main Street in Dover, Dover had until March 31 to decide whether to submit its application to participate in the program. Dover was one of five communities competing for up to three new Main Street designations in New Hampshire. Dover would be named a Main Street community later that year. Dover Main Street continues to serve the city today. The City Council and Dover Mayor Robert Carrier recognized Main Street with a proclamation this week during the City Council's regular meeting on Feb. 26.

March 1, 2009 — Despite a last-minute appeal to the federal government by local officials, the governor and New Hampshire's Congressional delegation, including an appeal to then Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, the National Passport Center, located in Dover, closed its doors, leaving 300 people out of work. The State Department said it would send work planned for the Dover operation, which was managed by AT&T, elsewhere. The National Passport Center at Pease in Portsmouth, which opened in 1992 after the closure of Pease Air Force Base, was not open to the public at the time and only handled expedited passport requests from across the country. The Pease facility began accepting applications from the public a year after the Dover facility closed. Today, the National Passport Center at Pease is a major passport processing facility. It operates with extended hours, from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., Monday through Friday, and handles a significant portion of U.S. passport applications.



Learn why Mount Washington is home of the world's worst weather at Dover Public Library

Weather at the highest point in the northeastern United States can get a bit crazy. Wind has been recorded at 231 miles per hour, the average snowfall is about 42 feet per year, and temperatures can drop as low as minus 47 degrees Fahrenheit.

It's no surprise that Mount Washington has been called the "Home of the World's Worst Weather." Join Dover Public Library on Wednesday, March 12, at 6:30 p.m. to learn about the unique life and work of the weather observers stationed on Mount Washington. Brian Fitzgerald, Mount Washington Observatory's director of education, will explore their day-to-day activities while also explaining why Mount Washington hosts some of the worst weather on Earth for a mountain its size.

This program will be held in Room 306 of the McConnell Center, located at 61 Locust St. in Dover. For directions on how to locate the library in its temporary location, visit <u>tinyurl.com/DPLrenovation</u> for maps and video tours.

Before becoming the observatory's director of education, Fitzgerald served as a summit intern and weather observer/education specialist, helping to deliver educational programs and tours on the summit. In addition to his experiences on "the Rockpile," Fitzgerald has worked as Blue Hill Observatory's chief weather observer, and as a hut croo and naturalist for the Appalachian Mountain Club's backcountry huts. He holds a bachelor's degree in environmental conservation studies from the University of New Hampshire and a master of education in science education from Boston University.

This event is free and open to the public.
