Coming up at the next City Council meeting

### Housing Committee, budget adjustments on Council's July 23 agenda

The City Council will receive a report from its ad-hoc Committee to Address Community Housing Needs during the Mayor's Report at the July 23 City Council meeting.

The City Council formed the committee in 2023, charging it to review relevant data to "recommend long-term strategies for the City Council and City Manager to encourage and incentivize thoughtful development for residents of all incomes, ages, and abilities." Its final report is due to the City Council by Dec. 31, 2025.

At the beginning of the meeting, the City Council will hold a public hearing on a pending resolution that would add stop signs on Fairfield Drive, Milk Street, Old Rollinsford Road, Page Avenue and Richardson Drive. The passage of the resolution has been endorsed by the Transportation Advisory Committee.

8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The City Council will be asked to authorize additional funding for the Fifth and Grove Reconstruction Project to cover unexpected expenses, including both construction costs and construction oversight.

The Council will hold a first reading on several budget adjustments, all of which will require a public hearing on Aug. 13, 2025, a vote on Aug. 27, 2025, and a two-thirds vote of the Council to be authorized.


One is a resolution to rescind the Dec. 13, 2023 debt authorization of \$2.5 million for the high school athletic complex project, as the Council had authorized the full amount of \$18,037,000 at its June 25, 2025 meeting.

A second resolution would rescind the Dec. 11, 2024 debt authorization of \$850,000 for Fire and Rescue's South End Station addition project. Earlier this year, the City Council authorized Fire and Rescue to lease space on Crosby Road, negating the immediate space needs for the station.

A third resolution would authorize reprogramming \$278,434 of unused debt authorization to help fund the retrofit part of the Liberty North Fire Station vacated by Inspection Services into a training facility.

# Oak Street to be closed between Broadway and Ela starting Monday

# Paving operations impact Chestnut Street intersection starting July 25

Weather permitting, Chestnut Street in the area of Fifth Street will be reduced intermittently to one lane of alternating traffic starting on Friday, July 25 for paving operations. The traffic pattern is expected to continue on Monday, July 28. Motorists should anticipate delays in the area between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m.

The paving operations are part of the final paving work for the Fifth and Grove Reconstruction Project. Fifth Street will be milled and paved from Central Avenue to Fourth Street, including the intersection of Chestnut Street. Grove Street will also be milled and paved from Fourth Street to Sixth Street.

Parking will be prohibited in the work area during operations.

# Jenny Thompson Outdoor Pool closing for season Aug. 10 for rehabilitation

The Jenny Thompson Outdoor Pool will close for the season on Sunday, Aug. 10, 2025, to allow a major pool renovation to begin. It's currently projected to reopen in late June 2026.

The rehabilitation includes repairing the foundation of the 47-year-old pool, which has significant cracks that have led to excessive water loss. The deck of the pool will also be resurfaced, and its pumping, filtration, and operational control equipment will be upgraded. There will also be electrical modifications to meet current life-safety code requirements. The project will also encompass general site improvements, including a new perimeter fence, ADA accessible parking accommodations, and restorative landscaping.

Earlier this year, the City Council authorized the city to award the contract for the rehabilitation to Northeast Earth Mechanics, LLC, for \$3,585,124, following a competitive bid process. The project cost is partially offset by a \$500,000 federal grant.

The city previously contracted with the engineering firm, Weston & Sampson, to determine the scope of work and create bidding documents. The firm will also oversee the

rehabilitation work.







The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.


July 20, 1837 — On this day, Deborah Coffin died at the age of 99, believed to be the oldest person in Dover at the time. She was born in 1738 in a house on Central Street, situated on a high embankment that was later leveled to make way for what became known as Varney's Block. Her family had lived in that same house for generations, until the powerful 1755 earthquake, known as the Cape Ann earthquake, shook the region and caused the chimney to collapse on the home. Deborah's great-grandfather was Peter Coffin, an early settler and mill owner whose fortified home, or garrison, once stood on the site of her birth. In 1689, during a period of violent retribution by the Indigenous Pennacook and their allies for years of betrayal and mistreatment by colonial leaders. Peter Coffin's home and mills were destroyed. The same coordinated uprising resulted in the death of Major Richard Waldron, a powerful colonial magistrate, at the hands of Native forces who had long sought justice for his earlier deception and brutal treatment of Indigenous people. Deborah was the eighth of 10 children. She recalled that in her youth, women going out to milk the cows were always accompanied by a man carrying a musket. a precaution that reflected the lingering fears from earlier decades of conflict between colonists and Indigenous communities. Much of the land along what is now Washington Street had originally been granted to Peter Coffin in the 17th century. Remarkably, much of that land remained in the Coffin family's hands until Deborah's death, affectionately remembered by locals as "Aunt Deborah."

**July 25, 1857** — Dr. Ezra Green dies on this day at the age of 101 years and 28 days. Born on June 17, 1746, in Malden, Mass., Ezra Green graduated from Harvard College in

1765 and moved to Dover two years later to begin his career as a physician. When the American Revolution broke out, Dr. Green put his medical skills to service in both the Continental Army and Navy, serving for five years. He was the surgeon aboard the Ranger under the command of the legendary Captain John Paul Jones, a key figure in early American naval history. After the war, Dr. Green returned to Dover, where he remained a highly respected member of the community for the rest of his life. In his early post-war years, he stepped away from medicine and became a successful merchant, frequently traveling to Boston to acquire goods for his store. In 1790, he was appointed Dover's first official postmaster by President George Washington, a role he held until he voluntarily resigned during the presidency of Thomas Jefferson. His appointment reflects the federal government's efforts to establish reliable postal services in the new nation and the trust placed in Green by its founding leaders. Dr. Green stayed active well into old age. He regularly attended church services and participated in town meetings, even casting votes when he was nearly 100 years old. He maintained a strong interest in public affairs throughout his life and remained a pillar of civic life in Dover. To learn more about Dr. Green, see https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=4w9efterz8c.

July 21, 1864 — President Abraham Lincoln issued a new call for 500,000 more Union troops during the Civil War, as the bloody conflict entered its fourth year. Under this federal order, New Hampshire was responsible for supplying 6,502 men, with Dover's share set at 149. Thanks to a credit system, which accounted for prior enlistments and other contributions, Dover was able to reduce its obligation to around 110 men. Just two days later, on July 23, the Dover City Council held a special meeting to respond swiftly to the call. Councilors voted to offer the highest enlistment bounties allowed under recent legislation from the New Hampshire Legislature: \$100 for volunteers who agreed to serve one year, \$200 for two-year commitments, and \$300 for those willing to serve three years. These incentives were a common practice in Union states during the later years of the war, designed to boost enlistment and avoid the need for a draft. Mayor Daniel Hall was authorized to take immediate action to implement the plan and ensure Dover met its quota. At the time, local governments across the North often took the lead in raising troops by offering financial incentives, organizing recruitment efforts, and managing community support for the war.

**July 21, 2001** — Dover Middle School prepared to roll out laptops in classrooms, replacing trips to the computer lab. That fall, in what was then a cutting-edge move, Dover Middle School students would begin using laptops in class instead of trekking to a shared computer lab. The school, with more than 1,000 students and only 30 stationary computers, introduced 50 laptops and a pair of wireless "access points," devices that allowed students to connect to the school's network without plugging in. At the time, this was a bold step forward. Wi-Fi was still in its infancy, and the idea that any room, even the gym, could become a "computer lab" was revolutionary. Superintendent Armand LaSelva championed the concept of mobile computer labs, believing it made more sense to bring technology to students rather than send students to technology. Each laptop, costing about \$950, could wirelessly access the internet once within range of an access point, an innovation that helped usher in a new era of classroom flexibility. The initiative also aimed to boost student engagement by giving teachers new ways to assign and manage work digitally. Today, more than two decades later, students routinely carry their own devices, entire buildings are blanketed in high-speed Wi-Fi, and cloud-based collaboration is standard. But in 2001, a classroom full of wireless laptops was enough to make headlines.

The concert features impersonator Rick Anthony, a dynamic entertainer who zoomed into big-time entertainment practically overnight. Born in Lawrence, MA, Anthony began paying tribute to the late Elvis Presley for audiences when he was 14 years old at a school lip-sync contest. He borrowed an Elvis-style jumpsuit, a terrible wig, and took home first place. He decided to use his own theatrical talents and studied the voice and energetic performance style of Elvis to create his own high-quality performances. Through the years, Anthony has achieved many awards and performed for audiences throughout New England, Florida (including Walt Disney World), Canada, and as far east as the Azores, Portugal.
