Dover Police Charities, and the Dover Housing Authority  
police liaison program. The workshop on Aug. 5 will focus on

programs and initiatives offered by the department to address this need.

Continuity of operations planning is ensuring the city government can continue to perform mission essential functions during a wide range of emergencies — natural, human-caused, technological threats, national security emergency — where emergency operations management may need to temporarily relocate its operations to assure continuance of its essential functions.

The local emergency plan outlines the management and coordination of resources and personnel during major emergencies. This comprehensive plan is designed to ensure effective mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery from both natural and human-made hazards.

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## Dover Police to host National Night Out event on Tuesday

The Dover Police Department will host its annual National Night Out event on Tuesday, Aug. 4, from 4 to 7 p.m. at police headquarters, 46 Chestnut St. The event is free and open to the public.

National Night Out is a time for community members to meet with police officers, discuss issues, learn what the police do, and unite with the common goal of crime prevention and safety.

Visitors can explore police vehicles and equipment, including a cruiser, motorcycle, crime scene vehicle, and tactical rescue vehicle. Officers, including the department's K-9 unit, will be on hand to interact with the public.

There will also be other City of Dover departments as well as community organizations on hand to provide literature and other information related to the Dover community. Information on drug prevention, treatment and recovery resources, violence prevention, and local mental health resources will be available to the public through various booths at the event. The Loyal Order of Moose Lodge 443 will be outside the station cooking hamburgers and hot dogs free for the public.

"The members of the Dover Police Department want to meet our residents," said Dover Police Chief David A. Terlemezian. "We recognize the importance of interacting with our community and the value of positive police-community partnerships. This annual event provides the community and our officers an opportunity to meet and talk in a casual and fun setting. I look forward to meeting new people each year."

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## Oak Street bridge topic of NHDOT informational meeting next week

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) will host a Public Informational Meeting to discuss bridge rehabilitation and replacement alternatives, with associated roadwork and traffic control, including detours, of the state-owned Red List bridge (069/046) carrying Oak Street over the CSX rail line in the City of Dover and the Town of Rollinsford. The meeting will include Dover officials.

The meeting will be held Thursday, Aug. 6, 2026, at 6 p.m. in Council Chambers and the Council Conference Room at Dover City Hall. The public is encouraged to attend and participate.

The purpose of the meeting is to present citizens and public officials with information regarding the proposed project and to solicit public input to ensure that project decisions meet public transportation needs and community goals and protect and enhance the environment.

This project will affect cultural or historic resources that may be eligible for or listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Individuals or organizations with a demonstrated interest in the potential impacts to historic resources have an opportunity to become Consulting Parties under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act. Additional information will be provided at the public informational meeting.

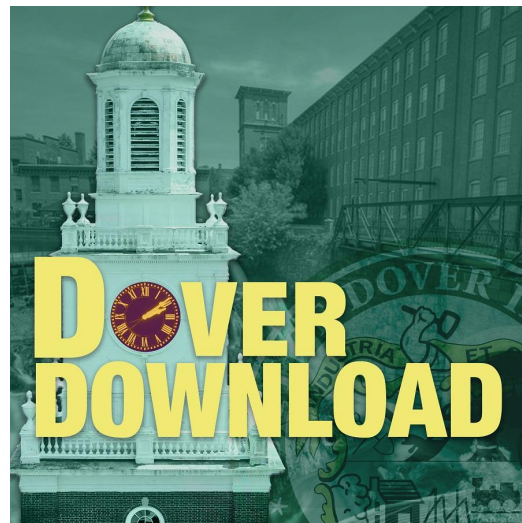

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## **Supervisors of the Checklist in session Wednesday**

The Supervisors of the Checklist will be in session on Wednesday, Aug. 5, 2026, from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. in the City Clerk's office at Dover City Hall, 288 Central Ave.

During this session, supervisors will register new voters, record changes of address, and make other necessary corrections to the checklist. The supervisors will also re-register voters who received an annual verification letter and remove voters who did not respond to the annual verification letter.

The Supervisors of the Checklist previously met on June 2, 2026, and identified registered voters who had not cast a ballot in five years. Those voters were mailed a letter informing them of their pending removal from the checklist and the need to re-register before voting. Any voter who has voted at least once in the last five years, or who has registered to vote since the 2024 general election, will remain on the checklist and does not need to take any action. Active voters can review their voter registration information through the Secretary of State's voter information lookup portal, [app.sos.nh.gov](https://app.sos.nh.gov).

Voters can re-register during the Supervisors of the Checklist meeting, at the City Clerk's office during regular business hours, Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., and Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., and at the polls on election day. The next election is the state primary on Tuesday, Sept. 8, 2026.

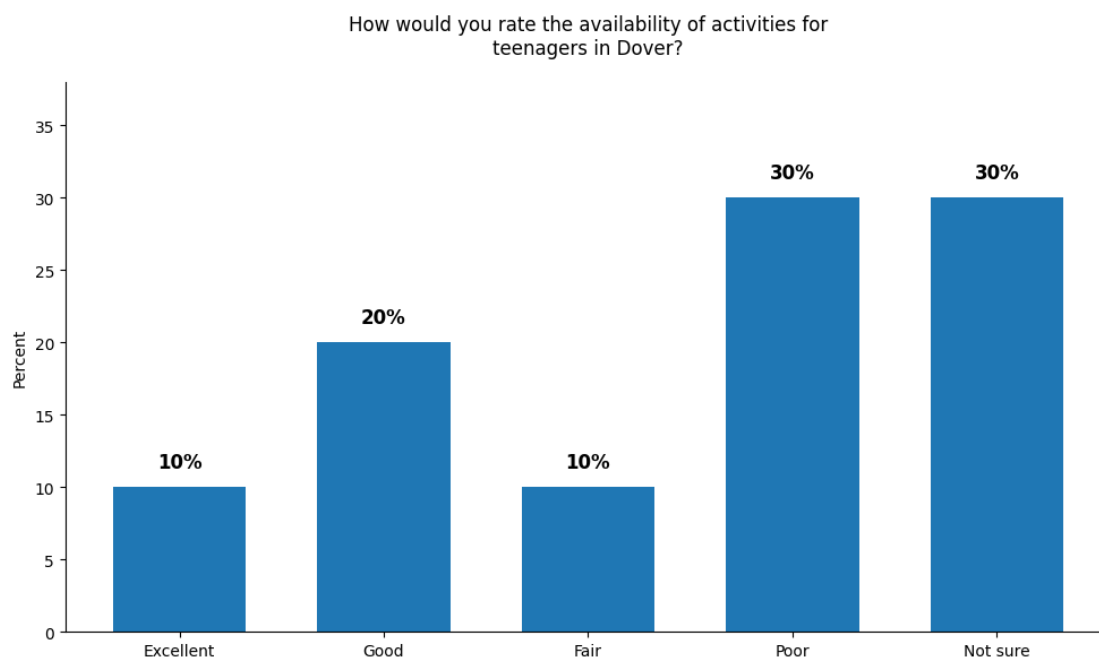

# This week in DOVER HISTORY



The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

**Aug. 2, 1644** — The colonial court ordered Elisabeth Giles, wife of Mathew Giles, to be whipped unless she paid a fine of 20 shillings. Her offense was described as using “reviling words” against members of the church—language that would now generally be understood as insulting, abusive or sharply disrespectful. The punishment reflects the close relationship between religion and civil government in early colonial Dover. The settlement had come under the authority of the Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1641, and Puritan religious principles strongly influenced its laws and courts. Although church and government technically held separate responsibilities, ministers and magistrates often worked together to enforce the community’s moral and religious standards. Words or behavior considered threatening to the authority of the church could therefore become a matter for the civil courts. Colonial Massachusetts laws permitted fines and corporal punishment for certain forms of offensive, defamatory or disruptive speech.

**July 31, 1848** — Alfred I. Sawyer, founder of the Sawyer Woolen Mills and one of Dover’s early industrial entrepreneurs, died at the age of 49. Born in Massachusetts in 1799, Sawyer came to Dover in the early 1820s and recognized the manufacturing potential of the Bellamy River. In 1824, he leased waterpower rights at the river’s Third Falls and built a two-story wooden mill on the site of an earlier grist mill. He also commissioned a new dam and began a small cloth-dressing operation. Sawyer steadily expanded the business. He added machinery for carding wool in 1825, acquired additional mill rights at the Second Falls the following year and began producing flannel. A second set of manufacturing equipment was installed in 1837. By the time of his death, the cloth-dressing, carding and flannel operations he had established were successful and profitable. Ownership passed to his brothers Zenas, Francis and Jonathan Sawyer. Under the Sawyer family, the company grew into one of Dover’s most important industries. The mills expanded along the Bellamy River, employed generations of workers and helped create the surrounding neighborhood known as Sawyer’s Village. By the early 1880s, the company had become New Hampshire’s largest woolen manufacturer.

**Aug. 4, 1858** — The City Council appointed a committee to confer with the Manufacturing Co. respecting a lease to the city of their land on Cochecho River, known as the “Grove,” for a public park; the city to lay out walks and ornament it with shrubbery, etc.

**Aug. 4, 1998** — PC Connection, headquartered in Merrimack, announced it would open a telemarketing operation at the Cocheco Falls Millworks and bring 200 new jobs to the region. The company leased 35,000 square feet of space, with an option for 20,000 more, on the second floor of the Cocheco Falls Millworks building. The floor had previously been occupied by Liberty Mutual. The company that week held two job fairs in the mill parking lot, the site of the old steam heating plant. PC Connection would eventually move from its Dover location in 2005.

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## Property owners must keep their vegetation from obstructing streets, sidewalks

Property owners are required by city code to maintain trees and shrubs on their land that extend over public roads or sidewalks, ensuring they do not block safe passage for pedestrians or vehicles. Failure to do so may result in city enforcement actions.



Trees and plants on private property must not obstruct traffic sight lines or sidewalks. They must also not block streetlights or create any public hazard. The minimum vegetation clearance is 10 feet above sidewalks, 12 feet above most public streets, and 16 feet above truck thoroughfare routes. See chapters [125-17](#) and [133-6](#) of the city code for complete requirements.

If a property owner fails to maintain their trees or shrubs, the city will issue a written notice requiring them to prune or remove the plants. If the vegetation is still not pruned, it is lawful for the city to do so and charge the property owner for the costs.

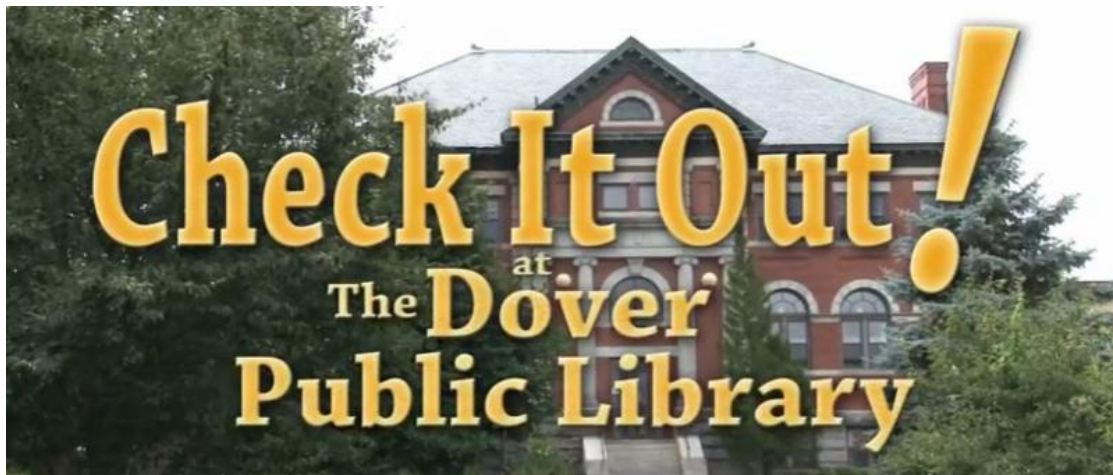
sidewalk chalk, among others.

# City of Dover to hold Household Hazardous Waste Day Oct. 17

The City of Dover, along with the towns of Rollinsford, Lee and Madbury, will hold a Hazardous Waste Collection Day on Saturday, Oct. 17, 2026, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., at the City's Community Services facility, 271 Mast Road.

The goal of Hazardous Waste Collection Day is to allow for the proper disposal of household hazardous materials. Residents of the four communities can bring household hazardous waste to Community Services for safe disposal.

The following household waste will be accepted: fertilizer with acids; bathroom cleaners; brush cleaner; pesticides; car waxes/polish; disinfectants; corrosives; fungicides; creosote; furniture polish paint/stain/finish; insect spray; driveway sealers/tar; metal polish (lead and oil-based); lighter fluid; flea powder; mothballs; rust preventatives; pest strips/traps; gasoline; oven cleaners; solvents; pesticides; radiator flush; photo chemicals; thinner/turpentine; poisons; roofing tar; rug cleaner; wood preservatives; pool chemicals; and wood strippers. Empty containers are not hazardous. Please dispose of them in your regular trash.

Explosives, asbestos, batteries, fluorescent bulbs, propane tanks, latex paint, waste oil and antifreeze will not be accepted.

Hazardous Waste Collection Day is for residents only. Proof of residency is required.

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## Red Cross declares emergency blood shortage

The American Red Cross is declaring an emergency blood shortage as the blood supply fell nearly 25% in June. Blood donors are urgently needed to give now to help ensure patients receive lifesaving medical care without delay.

The shortage comes during the height of trauma season, when hospitals frequently see increased demand for blood due to serious injuries and other medical emergencies, according to the Red Cross.

A steep decline in blood donations since the end of May has created a growing gap between supply and patient need. Currently, Red Cross distributions to hospitals are nearly 3,500 units higher per week than expected. The shortage is especially serious for types O positive and B negative blood. Blood donors are urgently needed to give now to help ensure patients receive lifesaving medical care without delay.

Every day, thousands of patients rely on lifesaving blood donations. The need for blood is constant.
