Waterfront park plan takes shape

Committee hears plans for new park at site of waterfront development project

The Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee (CWDAC) received an update at its June 21 meeting on the design of the public park planned for the waterfront project on River Street.

Jeffrey Hyland of Ironwood Design Group, a consultant on the project, spoke about the different elements planned for the public park. The planned park elements include active spaces, passive elements, such as nature trails that run along the river, and open park spaces.

"There are a variety of spaces trying to accommodate different uses," he said.

Hyland said Ironwood's goal is to finalize the design of the park so it will be ready for bidding in the next couple of months.

The committee also received updates on applications for permits needed for the project to move forward from Project Manager Steve Bird. He noted that the City of Dover has received preliminary approval last week from the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services for the needed wetlands permit. Bird said he anticipates receiving the remedial action plan permit in the coming weeks. The city was approved for the alteration of terrain permit in March of this year.

Last week, the <u>Planning Board conditionally approved</u> site review plans for the private development and public improvements at the project site.

Library seeks volunteers to help read Frederick Douglass' "What to the Slave is the Fourth of July?"

Dover Public Library is hosting this year's Frederick Douglass Community Read of "What to the Slave is your the Fourth of July?" on Friday, July 1, at 12 p.m.

The library is seeking volunteers interested in reading sections of the speech Douglass gave in 1852. For more information about the program or to sign up to read, visit <u>tinyurl.com/DoverFDRead</u>. Please share it with anyone you think might be interested.

The event will be outside on the lawn, weather permitting. If not, it will be held in the Lecture Hall on the library's top floor. People will be asked to read sections of an abridgement of Frederick Douglass's "What to the American slave is your Fourth of July" speech. It is broken into 44 sections.



Douglass was born into slavery in Maryland around 1817, escaped to freedom in 1838, and lived for a time in New Bedford and Lynn, Massachusetts. He became a national leader of the abolitionist movement and a voting rights champion for African Americans and women, among other legacies. Douglass was approximately 35 years old when he addressed the Rochester Anti-Slavery Sewing Society in Rochester, New York, on July 5, 1852, which became known as "What to the Slave is your Fourth of July?"

The Dover event is among numerous <u>simultaneous readings across the state</u>, including in Rochester, Rollinsford and Portsmouth.

Paving work, overnight road striping

scheduled for next week

Overnight road striping downtown and upper Central Avenue

Overnight road striping is planned for Washington Street, Main Street and Central Avenue, from Abbey Sawyer Memorial Drive to Glenwood Avenue. The work is scheduled for Monday and Tuesday nights, potentially continuing Wednesday night due to weather or other issues.

Parking and traffic restrictions

Parking will be prohibited overnight at the following locations, from 8 p.m. Monday, June 27 to 7 a.m. Tuesday, June 28, and from 8 p.m. Tuesday, June 28, to 7 a.m. Wednesday, June 29, to allow for street and parking space striping:

- First eight spaces on Henry Law Avenue closest to Washington Street;
- Both sides of Washington Street, from Central Avenue to Makem Bridge;
- Main Street;
- First two spaces on Portland Avenue closest to Main Street;
- First two spaces on Chapel Street closest to Main Street;
- First two spaces on School Street closest to Main Street;
- Eastern side of Central Avenue (Days Inn side), from Chapel to Broadway;
- Both sides of Central Avenue, from Broadway to the train tracks;
- First three spaces on Broadway closest to the Central Avenue intersection.

Broadway

Weather permitting, Broadway will be repaved from Pierce Street to 47 Broadway, including Red's Shoe Barn parking lot, next week. This paving is the final element of the Broadway culvert project, completed last year.

Preparation work is anticipated Monday, June 27. Paving will occur during the daytime on Tuesday, June 28 and Wednesday, June 29.

Traffic and parking restrictions

- On-street parking will be prohibited in the work area Monday through Friday, from 6 a.m. to 5 p.m.;
- Traffic will be reduced to one lane through the work area, alternated by flaggers.

Whittier Street

Weather permitting, Whittier Street will be reclaimed and paved from Sixth Street to Glenwood Avenue next week. Reclamation is the process of grinding the pavement in place and mixing it with the existing base gravel material to improve the strength of the base. Through traffic will be detoured around the work area.

Pavement reclamation is planned for Tuesday, June 28 and Wednesday, June 29. A base layer of pavement is scheduled to be installed on Thursday, June 30. The final layer of pavement will be installed next spring.

Traffic and parking restrictions

- Whittier Street will be closed to through traffic from Sixth Street to Glenwood Avenue;
- On-street parking will be prohibited Monday through Friday, from 6 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, <u>located here</u>.

June 24, 1832 — At a public town meeting the selectmen and physicians of the town formed a Board of Health and authorized it to adopt measures necessary for the public safety from the Asiatic cholera, then alarmingly prevalent in the country.

June 30, 1842 — The cars of the Boston & Maine Railroad crossed the Cochecho for the first time, arriving at the new Depot on Franklin Square at 10 o'clock, which with the bridge across the river was completed a few days previously.

June 24, 1853 — Died, Miss Elisabeth Coffin, aged 68. She was a lineal descendant of Peter Coffin and the last retaining the family name in Dover. She lived and died on lands originally owned by her ancestor, and which had remained in the family for 200 years.

June 29, 1859 — Wednesday, June 29, was the hottest day of the season, and the warmest for three years, the thermometer rising to 98 in the shade. By Friday morning, July 1, the mercury was down to 45. Frost was visible in many places. Frost again appeared in August.

June 28, 2004 — Members of the Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee toured the city's waterfront parcel as part of their burgeoning discussion about development of the land. While on site, the committee discussed a variety of ideas for the land, including a boat launch, public park and parking garage. Nearly 18 years later, on Tuesday, June 21, 2022, the same committee reiterated its endorsement of a plan to develop the waterfront, approved by the Planning Board earlier in June.

American Red Cross lifeguard training and recertification course

The Dover Indoor Pool will host the American Red Cross lifeguard training program from Aug. 22 to Aug. 25, 2022. Participants seeking to become lifeguards must attend all training sessions and be at least 15 years old on the last day of the class. Recertification will be held on Aug. 25.

The American Red Cross lifeguarding training program teaches participants the knowledge and skills to prevent and respond to aquatic emergencies. The course includes the latest science in first aid, CPR/AED for the professional rescuer, emergency cardiac care, and lifeguarding rescue skills and safety protocols.

Those seeking to take the course must meet the following prerequisites.

- Swim 300 yards continuously;
- Tread water for two minutes;
- The participant must be able to do the following within 1 minute, 40 seconds, starting from the water: swim 20 yards using front crawl or breaststroke, surface dive 7 to 10 feet, retrieve a 10-pound object, return to the surface, swim 20 yards back to the starting point with the 10-pound object and exit water without using a ladder;
- No refunds will be given for failing to meet prerequisite requirements.

The cost of the complete course is \$300. To be re-certified, the price is \$60. <u>Visit the Dover</u> <u>Indoor Pool website</u> for more information. Register online at <u>getactive.dover.nh.gov</u>. The registration deadline is Sunday, Aug. 14.

Water safety instruction course offered at Dover Indoor Pool

Dover Indoor Pool and the American Red Cross are offering a water safety instruction course in August. This course is geared toward those seeking to become swim instructors.

The training will occur from Aug. 15 to Aug. 18, 2022, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.; participants must

attend all sessions in their entirety. The cost is \$375, and the deadline to register is Aug. 1.

Prerequisites:

- Participants must be 16 by the last class;
- Tread water for one minute;
- Maintain position on their back for one minute in deep water;
- Swim 25 yards at Level 4 Proficiency for the front crawl, back crawl, breaststroke, sidestroke, elementary backstroke, and 15 yards for the butterfly stroke.

What to expect:

- In water teachings;
- Stroke decomposition and refinement;
- Teaching techniques for each stroke;
- Online coursework.

COVID-19 vaccines and testing

Vaccines are available at most local pharmacies, including walk-in service at some. For more information, visit <u>vaccines.nh.gov</u> and click on "Find COVID-19 Vaccines".

Tests for active COVID-19 disease are available in locations across New Hampshire and include both the polymerase chain reaction (PCR) test and the rapid antigen test. The PCR test is for persons with or without symptoms of COVID-19. The rapid antigen test is for persons with symptoms and within a specific timeframe after onset of symptoms.

Self-testing at home or anywhere

Self-tests for COVID-19 give rapid results and can be taken anywhere, regardless of your vaccination status or whether or not you have <u>symptoms</u>.

When to take a self-test:

- If you have any COVID-19 symptoms test immediately.
- If you were exposed to someone with COVID-19 test at least 5 days after your exposure. If you test negative for COVID-19, consider testing again 1 to 2 days after your first test.
- If you are going to an indoor event or a gathering test immediately before the gathering, or as close to the time of the event as possible. This is especially important before gathering with individuals at risk of severe disease, older adults, those who are immunocompromised, or people who are not <u>up to date on their COVID-19 vaccines</u>, including children who cannot get vaccinated yet.

Free tests are also available through local health departments.

Buy tests online or in pharmacies and retail stores. Private health insurance may reimburse the cost of purchasing self-tests. Visit the <u>FDA's website</u> for a list of authorized tests.
