Dover Police open house is Monday

The Dover Police Department is hosting a community open house on Monday, March 4, from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. The event will take place at the Police Department, located at 46 Chestnut St.

The open house will allow residents to go behind the scenes of the police department and learn about its daily operations. Attendees will be able to explore the facilities, meet patrol officers and detectives, and learn about various divisions like the school resources unit and prevention services.

There will be no formal agenda. The goal is to foster connections between community members and law enforcement through informal interactions.

Police Chief William Breault will be available to answer questions about public safety, the department's policing approach, and any other topics.

The open house is open to all.

Ward 4 state representative special election March 12

A special election will be held to fill the Strafford District 11 state representative seat on Tuesday, March 12, 2024. District 11 represents Dover Ward 4, Lee and Madbury.

The polling place for Ward 4 is Garrison Elementary School at 50 Garrison Road. Polling hours will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Need an absentee ballot? <u>Click here</u> for an application or visit the Dover City Clerk's Office in City Hall's Customer Service Center, located on the ground floor.



The two candidates on the ballot are Democrat Erik Johnson of Lee, and Republican Joseph E. Bazo of Madbury. <u>Click here</u> for a sample ballot. A special primary election was held on Tuesday, Jan. 23, 2024.

The special election will fill the seat that became vacant after the death of Rep. Hoy Robert Menear of Lee in November 2023.

Property tax credits and exemptions available for veterans, elderly, blind, deaf, disabled, and solar energy systems

The City of Dover offers property tax exemptions for qualified property owners that include veterans, the elderly, the blind, the deaf, the disabled, and those with solar energy systems.

To qualify for tax exemptions, a person must apply and demonstrate they meet requirements set out by state law, such as residency, asset, and income limits. The deadline to apply for exemptions for the December 2024 property tax bill is Monday, April 15, 2024.

Tax Credit for Veterans

The City of Dover offers credits for qualified veterans, their spouses, or surviving spouse, including:

Veterans' Credit provides up to \$750 per year for those who served on active service in a qualifying war/conflict with applicable awards. This credit also encompasses service members who have served on active service in a qualifying war/conflict and remain on active duty, and includes training for active duty by a member of the National Guard or Reserve member.

All Veterans' Credit provides up to \$750 per year for those who served or are currently serving and are not eligible for the Veterans' Credit. This also includes training for active duty by a member of the National Guard or Reserve.

Service-Connected Total and Permanent Disability Credit, providing up to \$4,000 annually to veterans totally and permanently disabled due to a service-connected disability; double amputees or paraplegics due to service-connected injuries also qualify.

Please refer to RSA 72:28, RSA 72:28-b, and RSA 21:50 for specific state law language regarding eligibility for these credits. Veterans and active service members are encouraged to contact the Tax Assessment Office at 603-516-6014 with questions about veteran tax credits and/or eligibility.

Elderly Tax Credit

Provides at least \$166,000 off the assessed property value for those who meet age, income, asset, and residency requirements.

- For ages 65 to 74, the exemption is \$166,000
- For ages 75 to 79, the exemption is \$234,000
- For ages 80 and older, the exemption is \$300,000.

Blind Exemption

Provides \$166,000 off the assessed property value for those who are legally blind. Must meet residency requirements

Deaf Exemption

Provides \$166,000 off the assessed property value for those who are deaf or have a severe hearing impairment. Must meet residency, income, and asset requirements.

Disability Exemption

Provides \$166,000 off the assessed property value for those who are eligible under Title II or Title XVI of the federal Social Security Act for benefits to the disabled. Must meet residency, income, and asset requirements.

Exemption for Solar Energy Systems

Provides up to \$30,000 off the property's assessed value of a solar energy system. As defined by RSA 72:61, a solar energy system utilizes energy to heat or cool the interior of a building or to heat water for use in a building that includes one or more collectors and a storage container. It also means a system that provides electricity for a building using photovoltaic panels. The amount of the exemption is the assessed value of the solar energy system, up to \$30,000.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information <u>located here</u>.

March 4, 1806 — A new three-day-a-week stagecoach line launched this day between Boston and Portland, with a stop in Dover, aiming to better accommodate travelers. Coaches departed both cities at 6 a.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, met that evening at a Durham tavern to exchange passengers, and then returned the next day. To manage demand, early sign-ups got boarding priority. The maximum capacity was set at nine passengers per coach. Nathaniel Ela of Dover co-founded the service, one of 10 proprietors looking to improve regional transportation options.


March 4, 1834 — The Cocheco Manufacturing Co. stopped operating for three days after female workers walked out to protest a reduction in pay.

March 2, 1860 — Abraham Lincoln, a Republican presidential candidate, stopped in Dover on this day during his only campaign trip to New Hampshire. He arrived by train to a welcoming crowd, then rode by horse and buggy to the home of a local mill owner. That

evening, Lincoln delivered a two-hour speech on slavery to over 1,500 people crammed into City Hall.

March 4, 1999 — On this day, the City Council heard details of a pilot study testing bacteria to clean up contaminants at the Tolend Road Landfill, which closed in 1979. Using bacteria to digest harmful chemicals through a process called bioremediation was estimated to save Dover millions compared to traditional capping methods. The bacteria break down contaminants into harmless forms. The EPA assessed the ongoing study, which initially yielded promising results.

March 7, 2002 — Dover Recreation held its annual volunteer recognition event on this day, honoring those who dedicate themselves to local youth recreation. Then-Mayor Alex Nossiff praised the "heart and soul" volunteers who make the community's sports leagues possible. The Volunteer of the Year award went to Bob Keays, who had volunteered with Dover Northside Cal Ripken Baseball League for 42 years and at the time of the award was still serving as vice president. Keays fondly reminisced about his four decades of volunteer service, during which he has seen many children through the baseball program. Keays, who also served on the City Council, died in 2008.



Plastic pollution topic of virtual program at Public Library

Much of what you've heard about plastic pollution may be wrong. Recycling is more complicated than we were taught, and plastic pollution isn't confined to the open ocean. Did you know that less than 9 percent of the plastic we create is reused? Or that it's in much of the air we breathe and food we eat?

Join the Dover Public Library virtually on Monday at 7 p.m. as author, photojournalist and scientist Erica Cirino shares her findings and current work communicating science-backed facts and solutions to plastic pollution as well as images from the frontlines of the plastic crisis.

In Cirino's book "Thicker Than Water: The Quest for the Solutions to the Plastic Crisis" she brings readers on a globe-hopping journey to meet the scientists and activists telling the real story of the plastic crisis. She hopes by sharing these facts immediate action can be taken to help our communities and protect our health from plastics.

Cirino is a science writer and artist exploring the intersection of the human and nonhuman

worlds. Her widely published photojournalistic works depict how people connect to nature and shape planet Earth.

Join three-time Iditarod participant Karen Land and her sled dog Noggin

Have you ever wondered what it feels like to ride the runners behind a team of dogs, steering a loaded sled across the vast Alaskan tundra?

Find out on Wednesday at 6 p.m. when the Dover Public Library presents "Mush! Noggin the Sled Dog (and her Human)."

Musher Karen Land, a three-time participant in the Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race, will be accompanied by her Alaskan husky Noggin, Iditarod dog sled, mushing gear, and Arctic clothing to answer questions like what it takes to care for a team of Alaskan huskies and how you prepare for a highly competitive race through mountainous terrain.

Land is a writer and public speaker and has competed in many sprint and endurance races, including ones in Alaska, Canada, Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, and Maine.

This year's Iditarod starts with a ceremonial start in Anchorage on Saturday, with the official start taking place the next day in Willow. The annual Alaska long-distance sled dog race began in 1973 and covers over 1,000 miles from Anchorage to Nome. Mushers have a team of 12 to 14 sled dogs and race from eight to 15 days in extreme weather, including blizzards, white-out conditions, sub-zero temperatures, and gale-force winds.
