City Council to hold public hearing on FY26 CIP bonding

Awarding annual paving contract also on the agenda

The City Council will hold a public hearing on a pending resolution that would authorize appropriation and bonding for the FY2026 Capital Improvements Program. The bonding would be for \$5,165,000 through the state's Drinking Water Revolving Fund that would be used for lead service line replacement projects. The Council will vote on the resolution at its April 9 meeting.

Also on the agenda:

 Awarding the city's annual paving contract. City staff recommends the City Council award the paving bid to Continental Paving, Inc., of Londonderry for Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. \$2,158,905.

- Authorizing additional engineering work for the Lower Central Avenue Improvement Project at a cost of \$435,230.
- Authorizing an additional scope of work for the Mill Street Pump Station project for \$97,305.
- Upgrading the light systems at the Dover Indoor Pool for \$26,510.

Dover Chamber's State of City forum to focus on Waterfront District development

The Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce will present its annual State of the City forum on Thursday, March 27, from 8 to 10 a.m. at 121 Broadway in Dover. The event, which is underwritten by Eversource, will focus on the development of the city's new Waterfront District. Additional sponsors include Breezeline and Kennebunk Savings.

City of Dover Deputy City Manager Christopher G. Parker will provide a historical overview of the waterfront development, while Jackie Huber, director of asset management with Waterfront District developer Cathartes, will deliver an update on the project from the development and construction standpoints.

These presentations will be followed by a panel discussion with Norm Fracassa, chair of the Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee; Cathartes Director of Development Rob Simmons; and restaurateur Evan Hennessey, who is the first commercial tenant for the Waterfront District Development.

Budget presentations conclude

The City Council held its <u>third budget workshop</u> this week on Wednesday, March 19, where it reviewed Community Services, Libray and DoverNet/Informational Technology departmental budget proposals. A video recording of the workshop and accompanying presentation slides are available on the <u>FY2026 Budget Revealed webpage</u>. There is also a document of suggested General Fund budget adjustments for the City Council to consider.

On Wednesday, April 2, the City Council will hold its final scheduled budget workshop, where it will review the overall budget. If it is ready, the City Council will hold a special meeting after the workshop to adopt the FY2026 budget. If it does not adopt a budget on April 2, the Council can adopt the budget at its Wednesday, April 9 regular meeting.


DHS teacher nominated for national award for 'Reset Day' initiative

Dover High School chemistry teacher Sarah McCarron-Stewart has been nominated for National Life Group's 2024-25 LifeChanger of the Year award for her initiative launching the school's "Reset Day," now its second year.

Reset Day, held halfway through the school year between the first and second semesters, allows students and staff to focus on their mental well-being. and reset their focus for the second half of the year.

"The goals of this day are to build school community, provide a mental health-focused day at the midpoint of the school year to provide a reset before beginning a new semester, incorporate proactive mental health measures into our school year, and teach students ways that they can exercise self-care," Ms. McCarron-Stewart wrote ahead of the second annual Reset Day held on Jan. 24, 2025.

McCarron-Stewart was nominated by an anonymous colleague at Dover High School, who wrote that




"Thanks to Ms. McCarron-Stewart, 'Reset Day' is set to become a cherished DHS tradition," the nominator concludes.

The LifeChanger grand prize winner will receive a prize of \$10,000, with the four grand prize finalists receiving \$5,000. Ten additional LifeChanger award winners will receive \$3,000.





Breaking Barriers: Dover's women Olympians who made history

Throughout Women's History Month, the City of Dover proudly celebrates local women whose achievements have helped shape our community. This week, we honor six remarkable athletes who have represented Dover—and the United States—on the world's greatest stage: the Olympic Games. These women have demonstrated extraordinary dedication, resilience and talent, inspiring generations to dream big and push boundaries.

One of Dover's most celebrated Olympians is **Jenny Thompson**, a swimmer who won 12 Olympic medals, including eight gold medals, across four Games (1992, 1996, 2000, and 2004). A record-setting competitor from a young age, Thompson trained with the Seacoast Swimming Association in Dover under coaches Amy and Mike Parratto. Beyond the pool, she pursued a medical career, becoming an anesthesiologist, proving that excellence extends beyond athletics.

Diver **Jessica Parratto** followed in her parents' footsteps, competing in the 2016 and 2020 Olympics. Overcoming injuries and the challenges of a pandemic-delayed Games, she earned a silver medal in synchronized diving in Tokyo and placed fourth in the individual platform event.

Distance runner **Cathy Schiro O'Brien** competed in the 1992 and 1996 Olympic marathons. At just 20 years old, she made history as the youngest American woman to run the Olympic marathon, later winning the 1992 Boston Marathon—breaking barriers in a sport long dominated by men.

Liza Corso, a Paralympic middle-distance runner from nearby Newmarket, trained at Portsmouth Christian Academy in Dover. She secured a silver medal in the 1,500-meter T13 event at the 2020 Tokyo Paralympics, demonstrating resilience and competitive spirit.

Field hockey standout **Barbara "Barb" Marois** competed at the 1988 and 1996 Olympics, leading the U.S. team to a fifth-place finish in Atlanta. A three-time Pan American Games medalist, she remains a respected figure in the sport.

Finally, rower **Jennie Marshall** competed in the women's quadruple sculls at the 1988 Olympics, also earning multiple international medals, including silver at the 1987 Pan American Games.

These Olympians are honored on a Faces of Dover marker at Henry Law Park.


Pay by text now an option at Dover's parking meters

City motorists can now pay for parking meter time by text. This is in addition to paying at the meter and using the smartphone "Flowbird" app.

By texting "DOVER" to 727563, the user will receive a link that asks for their parking zone number. All Dover zones start with "11." Once the zone is entered, a drop-down list will appear that includes a description of the locations and the full zone numbers. The only exception is the Orchard Street Parking Garage, which is zone '1". All zones are listed on the sides of meters throughout the downtown to assist in selecting the proper zone. Additional signs will be posted in the coming months.

If you already have the Flowbird Pay by Phone app on your phone, when you text Dover to 727563 the program will automatically forward you to your Flowbird account. If you experience connection issues, try turning off your phone's WIFI and using a cellular connection.







The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information located here.

March 26, 1759 — At a public town meeting held at the old meeting house on Pine Hill, the townspeople of Dover appointed Col. John Gage, Capt. Howard Henderson, and Lt. Dudley Watson to form a committee. Their task was to petition the General Assembly for permission to raise funds through a lottery to build a bridge over the Cochecho River. The bridge was seen as essential for improving travel and trade in the growing community. In the mid-18th century, town lotteries were a common method for funding public projects, as government resources were limited.


March 25, 1856 — On this day, Dover's newly established city government held its first official meeting. The event marked a significant transition from town to city. The newly elected mayor, the Hon. Andrew Peirce, took the oath of office, officially becoming Dover's first mayor. At the same time, Charles Clements, Esq., the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, formally handed over the town's official seals and records to the new city administration, symbolizing the shift from town governance to a structured municipal government. By the mid-19th century, Dover had outgrown its town governance structure, leading to a push for city status. In 1855, Dover officially became a city, adopting a mayoral and city council system to manage its expanding infrastructure, industries, and civic needs more efficiently. This transition reflected a broader trend in New England, where growing towns sought more structured governments to handle the complexities of urban life.

March 22, 1889 — Dover's second City Hall, built in 1867 for \$71,000 at the corner of Central Avenue and Washington Street, was destroyed by fire. Despite the city's new water system and a capable fire department, the blaze spread rapidly and could not be contained. The fire was first spotted near the furnace by a police officer, who sounded the alarm. Initially, firefighters believed they had extinguished it, but flames suddenly erupted

in the courtroom, spreading to the stage and dressing rooms, sealing the building's fate. City officials rushed to save important documents and furniture. Clerk of Court George E. Durgin managed to secure valuable records, while City Clerk John B. Stevens, Register of Deeds Frank Thompkins, and Register of Probate C.S. Clifford also salvaged critical materials. The fire briefly spread to the nearby Belknap Church but was extinguished by the Cocheco Manufacturing Company's hose crew. The City Hall's dome, fully engulfed, collapsed in a fiery spectacle. Remarkably, the tower clock continued running until flames consumed the structure, stopping at 3:30 a.m. The current municipal building at 288 Central Ave. is Dover's fourth City Hall.

March 25, 1968 — Dover High School teachers squared off against Marshwood High School teachers in the first faculty basketball tournament held between the schools. The Marshwood Hawks downed the Green Wave teachers by a pounding 77-63. The high scorer for Marshwood was Rod Wotton, who racked up 27 points. The high scorers for Dover were Jack Barron with 16, and 10 points each for Dale Hanson, Greg Kageleiry and Ron Montalto.

March 24, 2004 — Then Dover Mayor Scott Myers officially declared March 24 as Paul LeBlanc Day to honor the longtime WTSN radio host's 40 years of service. LeBlanc had been a morning fixture at Dover's WTSN since 1964, delivering news, weather, and sports updates to local listeners. Starting his radio career as a teenager, LeBlanc worked at various New Hampshire stations before returning to WTSN. Known as the "morning mayor," he interviewed politicians, covered major events like the Vietnam War, and followed University of New Hampshire sports. At the time of his 40th anniversary at WTSN, LeBlanc was recognized as New England's longest-serving radio host at a single station. He said his job was "an opportunity to serve the community." LeBlanc retired from WTSN in 2008. His last broadcast was on July 11, 2008.



Virtual Author Talk with bestselling author Marie Benedict

Since 2016, Heather Terrell — known professionally as Marie Benedict — has written stories about fascinating women in history whose contributions have been overshadowed by the men in their lives.

On Wednesday, April 2, at 7 p.m., bestselling author Marie Benedict will join Dover Public Library virtually to discuss her newest historical fiction book, "The Queens of Crime." The author talk is in partnership with the Tewksbury Public Library. Registration is required to receive a link to the livestream and can be found on the Dover Public Library's <u>event calendar</u> at the library website.

"The Queens of Crime" follows five of the greatest women crime writers as they form a secret society with a single goal: to show they are no longer willing to be treated as second-class citizens to their male counterparts in the legendary Detection Club.

The group, led by Dorothy L. Sayers, includes Agatha Christie, Ngaio Marsh, Margery Allingham and Baroness Emma Orczy. They plan to set themselves apart by solving the highly publicized murder of a young woman found strangled in a park in France — a woman who may have connections to the highest levels of the British establishment.

Benedict is the New York Times and USA Today bestselling author of historical fiction including "The Only Woman in the Room," "Carnegie's Maid" and "The Other Einstein." With Victoria Christopher Murray, she co-wrote "The Personal Librarian," a Good Morning America Book Club pick, and "The First Ladies," Target's Book of the Year. Her books have been translated into 30 languages and selected for numerous book clubs and reading lists.

This event is free and open to the public.
