City Council begins final budget deliberations

The City Council will hold a workshop on Wednesday, April 2, 2025 for general budget review. The workshop provides a forum for the City Council to seek additional information and shape the budget into its final form. The workshop, which will be held in Council Chambers at City Hall, begins at 6 p.m.

Council members will discuss what aspects of the proposed budget they want to keep, add to, and/or remove.

Following the workshop, if it is ready, the City Council will call a special meeting for a budget adoption vote. The Council may also opt to defer adoption to its regular meeting on Wednesday, April 9. City ordinance requires the City Council to adopt the city's budget annually by April 15, which goes into effect on July 1.

The workshop and special meeting follow nearly two months of budget meetings, workshops and public hearings.

Dover's waterfront development takes center stage at State of City forum

City officials and developers shared progress on the "Waterfront District" project at Thursday's State of the City forum, highlighting a decades-long vision now coming to fruition along the Cochecho River. The event was held at 121 Broadway in Dover.

Deputy City Manager Christopher Parker provided the historical context for the 29-acre waterfront redevelopment, which has evolved from an industrial site and public works facility to what will soon become an extension of downtown.

"This site is our future," Parker said at the event. "This site shows how this community continues to evolve and grow."

Jackie Huber, director of asset management with Cathartes, revealed that the first phase of apartments and townhouses, called "The Truette," is expected to be completed this winter. The development will include 197 apartments, 23 townhouses, co-working space, and over 10,000 square feet of commercial space.

Chef Evan Hennessey announced he will open a new restaurant called "Topolino," meaning "little mouse" in Italian, at the development. Unlike his fine dining establishment, Stages, Hennessey described the new venture as "casual Mediterranean, very community-based."

The project will also feature Nebi Park, which Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee Chair Norm Fracassa said will be larger than Henry Law Park. The park is named 'Nebi' to honor the area's indigenous heritage. The park will include a pavilion building scheduled for completion by December.

The Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce event was underwritten by Eversource with additional sponsorship from Breezeline and Kennebunk Savings. The event space was made available by Summit Land Development.

26th Heyliger Awards honor those bettering city's youth sports

Garrison City F.C.'s Paul Barns named 2024 Volunteer of the

Year

The Dover Recreation Department and the Recreation Advisory Board held their 26th Don Heyliger Awards Ceremony on March 25, celebrating the excellence, dedication, outstanding achievements and perseverance of individuals who have made remarkable contributions to Dover's youth organizations.

Sponsored by Dover Recreation and the Recreation Advisory Board, the event unites the city's youth organizations to honor the individuals, groups, and businesses whose time and resources sustain these programs, enhancing Dover's quality of life.

The Heyliger Awards honor Don Heyliger, Dover's beloved Recreation Director, who served the community with great dedication for 10 years before his sudden death in 1988. Award recipients possess the same high-quality traits: treating players with respect, ensuring every child participates, motivating with praise, building confidence, showing compassion, supporting the disadvantaged, and being fun to be around.

The Recreation Advisory Board honored volunteers from each youth sports organization: Paul Barns (Garrison City F.C.), David Devoy (Dover Football League), Cam Paquette and Camden Barrett (Dover Youth Basketball), Josh Hersey (Dover Youth Hockey), Jamie Stevens (Dover Youth Softball), Tim Pine (Dover Baseball), The Merrill Family (Cocheco Lacrosse), and Melissa Chandler (Dover Little Green Cheerleading).

After careful consideration, the Recreation Advisory Board awarded Garrison City F.C.'s Paul Barns with the Heyliger's marquee "Volunteer of the Year" award. The youth soccer organization applicated the recognition.

"Paul is the first person to raise his hand when there is a job that needs to be done," Garrison City F.C. posted on their Facebook page. "Whether it's helping the club make a tough decision, coaching a group of children, or going out to the fields alone on a blistering summer day to make sure the fields are lined for game day, Paul is an indispensable reason why kids in Dover are able to play soccer at all."

The event was held at Loyal Order of Moose Lodge #443, which generously donated its banquet hall. The evening underscored the vital role of community spirit and volunteerism in shaping Dover's youth and future.

Dover Mayor, Council honor local athletic achievements with proclamations

Mayor Robert Carrier and the Dover City Council recognized three outstanding athletic achievements this week during the March 26 council meeting.

Lilly Nossiff, a Dover High School basketball standout, was honored for scoring her 1,000th career point in a December game against Nashua High School. Standing 6-foot-2, Nossiff has played varsity since her freshman year, wearing jersey number 54 — the same number worn by her coach's daughter who also achieved the 1,000-point milestone at Dover High.

Nossiff has excelled both athletically and academically. In fall 2025, she will attend St. Anselm College to play Division II basketball while pursuing an education degree.

The St. Thomas Boys Varsity Hockey Team received recognition for winning the Division 2 State Hockey Championship, the program's fourth title since its establishment in 1980. The Saints finished with an impressive 17-4 record after failing to qualify for playoffs the previous season.

Senior co-captains and 2025 All-State players Jackson Estes and Garrett Aceto led the team's offense, which averaged more than 6.5 goals per game. The championship journey included a dramatic semifinal comeback before a decisive 4-2 victory over Merrimack in the title game.

The St. Thomas Aquinas High School Girls Basketball Team completed a perfect 22-0 season to capture their second state championship in school history and first since 1981. Under Coach Kevin Giannino's leadership, the team dominated opponents with an average victory margin exceeding 25 points.

Senior Genna Bolduc was named Division 3 Player of the Year and received First Team All-State honors and the Jack Ford Award. Senior Emilie Von Der Linden earned First Team and All-Defensive Team selections, while junior Emma Toriello was named to the Second Team All-State.

Time to renew dog licenses

Dog licenses for 2025 are now available. All dogs must be licensed by April 30, 2025 to avoid a late fee. The cost for a male or female dog is \$10, a neutered male or spayed female dog is \$7.50 and puppies (3-7 months) are \$7.50 for first licensing.

Residents 65 years of age or older may license one dog for \$3 per household. Additional licenses require regular fees.

The City Clerk's office requires proof of rabies information and a certificate of spaying or neutering sent by email to Dover-TaxClerk@dover.nh.gov or by mail to City of Dover, City' Clerk's Office, 288 Central Ave., Dover, NH 03820.

Late fees of \$1 a month begin June 1, 2025.

Dog licenses can be renewed at the City Clerk's office at City Hall, by mail or online.

To ensure privacy, dog owners must provide the dog's tag number.

City's annual street sweeping underway

The city of Dover began its annual street sweeping operations this week, starting with cleaning sidewalks using blowers and brooms.

The Community Services Department will conduct the work through early June, with downtown streets scheduled for cleaning first before moving to the rest of the city.

Street sweeping operations typically begin at 3 a.m. and may require temporary parking restrictions. The city will provide advanced notice of these restrictions through signage, email and social media. Residents can sign up for these and other alerts by adding "Dover Alert: public safety alerts and special announcements" to their email subscription list at https://bit.ly/dovernewsletters.

The annual cleaning not only beautifies the city but also helps reduce pollutants entering the stormwater system. The city estimates street sweeping reduces the annual nitrogen load flowing into the Great Bay Estuary by 43 pounds.

The work this week is focused specifically on sidewalks, utilizing a combination of machine work and hand work with blowers and brooms. Street sweeping with vehicles is expected to begin next week, weather permitting. Overnight temperatures near or below freezing may delay street sweeping operations as the vehicles spray water for dust control.

Crews to demo, rebuild Central Avenue median at Fifth Street

Motorists should anticipate lane shifts and intermittent delays on Central Avenue at the Fifth Street intersection when crews demo and rebuild the median island. Parking will also be restricted in the immediate area when work occurs.

The demolition work is scheduled to occur on Monday, March 31. The rebuilding work is slated to begin Thursday, April 3.

The median island and crosswalk on Central Avenue at the Fifth Street intersection will be relocated northward by approximately 20 to 30 feet. This will also require relocation of the Central Avenue sidewalk tip-downs to ensure the crosswalk remains compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

The work is necessary to improve the turning radius for traffic making a left turn from Fifth Street onto Central Avenue. The median serves as a traffic safety device that allows drivers to better see pedestrians seeking to use this crosswalk. The work will also slightly shorten the length of the northbound turning lane for Sixth Street, but is not expected to adversely affect traffic flow.


City warns of 'utility refund' scam

The City of Dover's Water and Sewer Billing Office warns of a utility refund scam and urges the public to be cautious of letters or emails promising refunds, especially if they request sensitive information like banking or credit card details. The City of Dover would never request sensitive banking or other private information to process a refund.

This week, a Dover resident reported receiving a mailed scam letter claiming the resident overpaid their utility bill by \$100, and urged the resident to call a 1-800 phone number with alleged refund instructions. Smartly, the resident identified the letter as a scam, which the resident said looked professionally made, and shredded it.

If a utility overpayment occurs, City of Dover staff would mail the customer a check. City staff would never ask for sensitive banking information to process a refund.

Dover's first female mayor: Geraldine Sylvester broke barriers, built legacy

Throughout Women's History Month, the City of Dover proudly celebrates local women whose achievements have helped shape our community. This week, we honor Geraldine Sylvester, whose election as Dover's first female mayor in 1974 marked just one chapter in a remarkable life of public service.

Sylvester's political journey began in 1970 when she became the first woman elected to Dover's City Council. After serving as mayor pro tem, she secured the mayoral position in 1974 following a decisive electoral victory in which she was the top vote-getter across all wards.

Beyond her seven consecutive terms on the City Council, Sylvester established a legacy that extended far beyond politics. In 1971, she and her husband Robert founded GFS Manufacturing from their garage, a company that would grow to employ hundreds of local residents.

Perhaps most remarkably, between 1969 and 1981, the Sylvesters welcomed more than 200 troubled children into their Cocheco Street home, providing stability and care alongside their own seven children.

Following her council service, Sylvester was appointed Director of the Office of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention by Gov. John Sununu in 1983, a position she held for 13 years under three governors.

Her contributions earned numerous accolades, including honorary doctorates and recognition as Citizen of the Year by the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce in 1978.

After retiring, Sylvester authored three books, including her autobiography "Windy Hill," documenting her extraordinary journey from Milton, New Hampshire, to becoming one of Dover's most influential citizens before her passing in 2017 at age 86.

Donations sought to fund downtown's beloved blue crab repainting

Downtown businesses are seeking donations to help fund the repainting of the blue crab metal sculpture that has been a fixture of Henry Law Park since 2011.

The crab was removed last year to allow Dover High School's welding and automotive painting students to gain experience and learn skills while refurbishing the whimsical welded metal sculpture created by artist Nathan Walker with scrap metal. The crab was stripped of paint, repaired and rewelded. The final step is to repaint the crab with two coats of blue paint, pinstriping, and a protective clear coat. The painting costs are estimated at \$3,400.

Once finished, the crab will be remounted in its spot in Henry Law Park, welcoming those to the park and the Children's Museum of New Hampshire.







The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.


March 28, 1724 — The selectmen of Dover met and realized there was no official record of a public road connecting what was called the Cochecho area of Dover to Dover Neck, despite its frequent use. Recognizing its importance, they formally established this roadway. The designated route began at the main country road crossing the Bellamy River, west of the meeting house at Cochecho. From there, it extended along Dover Neck, passing near a spring close to Captain Millet's house, continuing between the properties of Captain Millet and Captain John Tuttle, and finally ending at Hilton's Point. The selectmen specified that the road should maintain a width of four rods (approximately 66 feet), with additional width allowed in areas where the terrain made travel difficult.

April 3, 1785 — Thomas Westbrooke Waldron died on this day. Born on July 26, 1721, Waldron was the great-grandson of Major Richard Waldron, a prominent figure in early colonial New Hampshire. Thomas Waldron inherited significant land holdings from his family, making him one of Dover's most influential citizens during the mid-18th century. Waldron notably served as a Captain during the Siege of Louisbourg in 1745, a critical battle during King George's War. This successful campaign, led by Sir William Pepperell, was a pivotal moment in colonial military history, showcasing the growing strength and resolve of New England colonists. Beyond his military service, Waldron played a vital civic role. He represented the province at an important conference in Albany, served as a Provincial Representative, and was appointed to the Governor's Council. Following New Hampshire's transition from colonial rule to statehood after the American Revolution, he continued to serve in various town and county positions, further shaping Dover's early governance and development.

March 28, 1847 — The residents of Dover organized a public meeting to aid the people of Ireland who were suffering from the devastating effects of the Great Irish Famine (1845–1852). This famine was primarily caused by a potato blight—a disease that destroyed potato crops, which were the staple food source for much of the Irish population. During the meeting, a committee was formed to coordinate relief efforts, successfully raising approximately \$2,500 through donations, along with substantial amounts of food and

clothing.

March 31, 1942 — David McIntosh, who operated the former McIntosh Business College on Washington Street with his brother Edward, died on this day. David McIntosh, who was also the president of the Eastern Commercial Teachers Association, had moved to Dover from Ontario, Canada, where he was born, and remained in Dover for 45 years until his death. McIntosh purchased the former Dover Business College in 1902, changing the name to McIntosh Business College. The original building that housed the college was demolished during Urban Renewal.

National Public Health Week: Dover Library offers expert insight on bird flu outbreak

Over the last few months, grocery stores have had limited egg supplies and prices of the breakfast staple have risen. The two-word reason: bird flu.

Join the Dover Public Library virtually on Monday, April 7, at 7 p.m. for a more in-depth look at avian influenza and how it has affected everyday life.

In "Behind the Headlines: Understanding the Bird Flu," Dr. Catherine Brown, Massachusetts state epidemiologist and public health veterinarian, will provide a clear and authoritative overview of the nation's current situation and the risk that avian influenza presents.

Dr. Brown is the current president of the Council of State and Territorial Epidemiologists. She plays a key role at the state and national level in monitoring and responding to infectious disease threats and has been involved with avian influenza for over 20 years.

per fiscal year are available, depending on funding.


