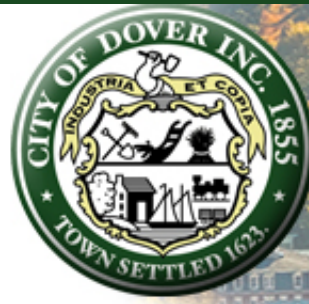
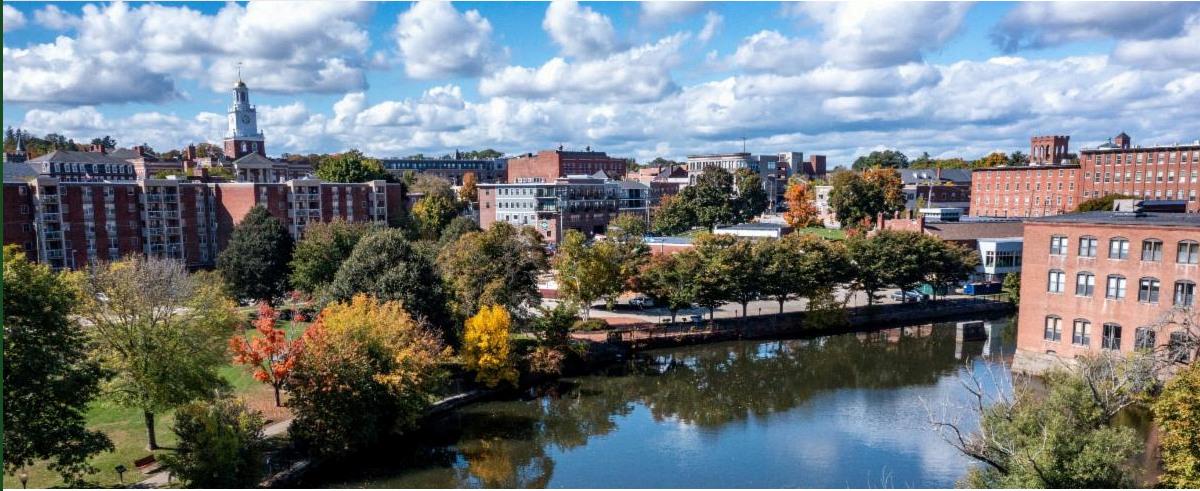

Coming up at the next City Council meeting

City Council to hold special meeting for public hearing on bonding, and pending legislation

Workshop to follow on Great Bay water quality, Tolend landfill cleanup

The City Council will hold a special meeting on Wednesday, June 3, to hold a public hearing on a resolution that reconfirms the City Council's authorization to sell bonds for the waterfront project that was [previously authorized](#) by the City Council in April 2023. The special meeting begins at 6 p.m. in City Hall's Council Chambers.

The need to reauthorize the 2023 resolution will correct a procedural error regarding the sale of bonds, which requires

that a public hearing notice be published in a newspaper of general circulation. The notice was never published. The city recently discovered the error while preparing for the sale of bonds scheduled for next month. The resolution will validate, ratify, and adopt the resolution to sell \$6 million in bonds, retroactive to April 26, 2023. The vote on the resolution will occur at the City Council's June 10 regular meeting. The repayment of the debt will be funded through the Waterfront Tax Increment Finance (TIF) District.

During the special meeting, the City Council will also take up two resolutions related to pending bills in the state legislature. One resolution would voice the City Council's support of House Bill 1491, which would establish a new statutory framework for the continued operation of "non-assessable risk pools," subject to the oversight of the New Hampshire Department of Insurance. The City of Dover is a participating member of HealthTrust, "a non-assessable government risk pool created by political subdivisions to pool risks and provide stable, cost-effective health coverage for municipal employees and retirees," according to the resolution.

A second resolution would voice the City Council's opposition to House Bill 1588. According to the resolution, HB1588 "is aimed at local zoning and threatens significant loss of local control over zoning by: (1) requiring municipalities to allow multi-family residential development by right in zones that permit commercial uses, (2) exempting proposed residential development on land zoned to permit commercial uses from all zoning ordinance requirements (e.g., density) except dimensional requirements; and (3) prohibiting municipalities from adopting zoning ordinances for residential development in commercial zones that differ from those for commercial development, effectively tying residential regulations to commercial regulations."

Immediately following the special meeting, the City Council will hold a workshop session to receive updates on the water quality permitting for Great Bay and remediation efforts of the former Tolend municipal landfill.

Dover Public Library reopening postponed to June 26

The reopening date for the Dover Public Library has been postponed to Friday, June 26, 2026, due to construction delays.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony will be held at 9 a.m. Friday, June 26. The public is invited to attend and explore the renovated library during an open house from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday, June 26, and from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday, June 27.

The Dover Public Library will continue to operate temporarily in Room 306 of the McConnell Center through Monday, June 22. The temporary location is open Mondays from 9 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. and Wednesdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Services available at the McConnell Center include:

- A browse collection of books for all ages, featuring items purchased within the past six months.
- Pickup of books on hold. Patrons may place holds only on browse books while the temporary location is in operation.
- Four computers for public use, with printing capabilities.
- Magazines and newspapers.
- Museum passes.
- Homebound delivery and the off-site All Abilities Club.
- Interlibrary loan services to borrow books from other libraries.

Road closures and parking restrictions in place Sunday for Soap Box Derby

Dover Police Chief David Terlemezian announces the following road closures, parking restrictions and traffic detour information for the 82nd annual New Hampshire Soap Box Derby on Sunday, May 31, 2026.

From 8 a.m. until approximately 4 p.m., Broadway will be closed to all traffic between the intersections of Oak Street, at the Rollinsford town line, and Hill Street.

All through traffic will be diverted via neighborhood streets, including Park and Hill streets. Oak Street will remain open.

Effective at 6 a.m. that day, on-street parking will be prohibited on Broadway in posted areas between Oak and Hill streets. Residents with driveways on this section of Broadway, or on Rose Street, will not be able to access their driveways by car during this time period and should plan ahead to park on nearby side streets. Businesses at 107-133 Broadway can still access the upper business parking lot from the Oak Street entrance.

The New Hampshire Soap Box Derby is an annual event for boys and girls ages 7 to 20 involving gravity-powered cars racing in side-by-side competition. Dover is the site of the 82nd annual New Hampshire local championship. Top-seeded racers in each region are eligible to compete in the All-American Soap Box Derby in Akron, Ohio. Jenny Thompson Outdoor Pool slated to reopen July 1

The major rehabilitation of the Jenny Thompson Outdoor Pool is nearly complete, with the Recreation Department preparing to reopen the pool on July 1. The pool has been closed since Aug. 10, 2025.

The rehabilitation of the pool includes repairing its foundation, named after the decorated Olympian who trained there in her youth. Work also includes the resurfacing of the pool deck and upgrading the pumping, filtration, and operational control equipment. The project also encompasses general site improvements, including a new perimeter fence, a storage building, ADA-accessible parking accommodations, and restorative landscaping.

Last month, the pool's old plaster was removed and the new main water piping was installed. This allowed for comprehensive leak and pressure testing of all pipes, both of which the pool passed successfully. The project contractor, NorthEast Earth Mechanics, LLC., then finalized the deck drainage system. The contractor is preparing to install new concrete for the pool deck and a new fence around the pool in the coming days.

The Dover Indoor Pool [continues operation](#) during the outdoor pool's construction.

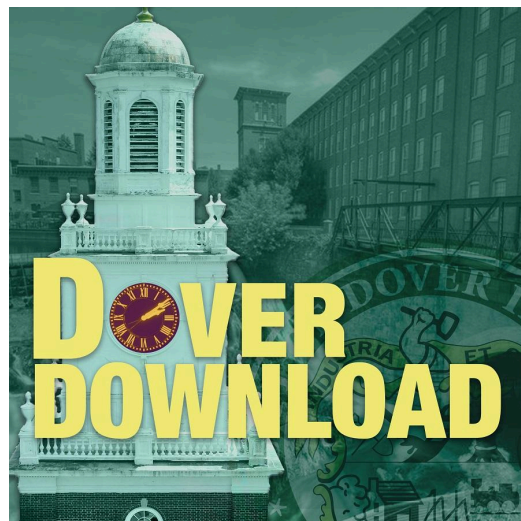

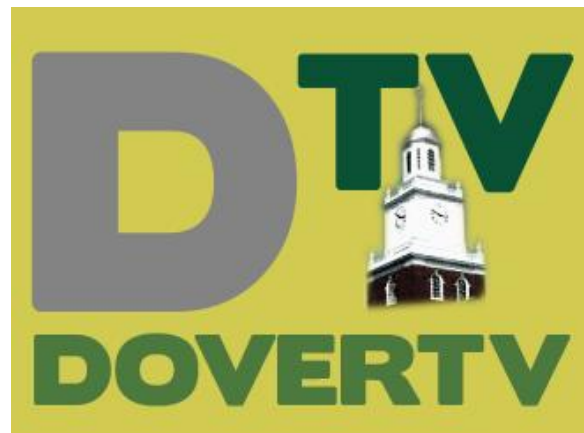

Supervisors of the Checklist annual voter checklist verification is June 2

The Supervisors of the Checklist's annual verification of the voter checklist is Tuesday, June 2 at 6:30 p.m.

During the session, the supervisors will identify registered voters who have not cast a ballot in five years. These voters will be mailed a letter informing them of their removal from the checklist and that they will need to reregister before voting. Voters can re-register at the City Clerk's office during regular business hours, Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., and Friday, from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Voters may also register at the polls on election day. The next election is the state primary on Tuesday, Sept. 8, 2026.

Any voter who has voted at least once in the last five years or has registered to vote since the 2024 general election will remain on the checklist and does not need to take any action.

Beginning this year, voter checklists are to be verified annually following a change in state law. Verification was previously required every 10 years. Dover's elected Supervisors of the Checklist last verified the list in 2021.

Active voters can review their voter registration information through the Secretary of State's voter information lookup portal, app.sos.nh.gov.

Deadline to change party affiliation is Tuesday

State Primary Election is Sept. 8

The last day a registered voter can change their political party affiliation before the 2026 State Primary Election is Tuesday, June 2, 2026. Per state law, voters may not change their party affiliation 90 days before a primary.

The Supervisors of the Checklist [will meet](#) on June 2 from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. at the City Clerk's office at City Hall, 288 Central Ave. The supervisors will register new voters, record changes of address, name and party affiliation, and make other necessary corrections to the checklist.

The Primary Election will be held on Tuesday, Sept. 8, 2026, with the General Election on Tuesday, Nov. 3. At the election, voters will cast ballots for county, state and federal offices.

Voters domiciled in Dover may change their party affiliation at the City Clerk's Office, or any scheduled meeting of the supervisors of the checklist except between the first day of the filing period for the primary election and the date of the primary election itself.

Registered voters may check their political party affiliation through the Secretary of State's [Voter Information Lookup](#). The voter must enter their last name, town/city, and date of birth, and complete the security entry.

Candidate filing period June 3-12

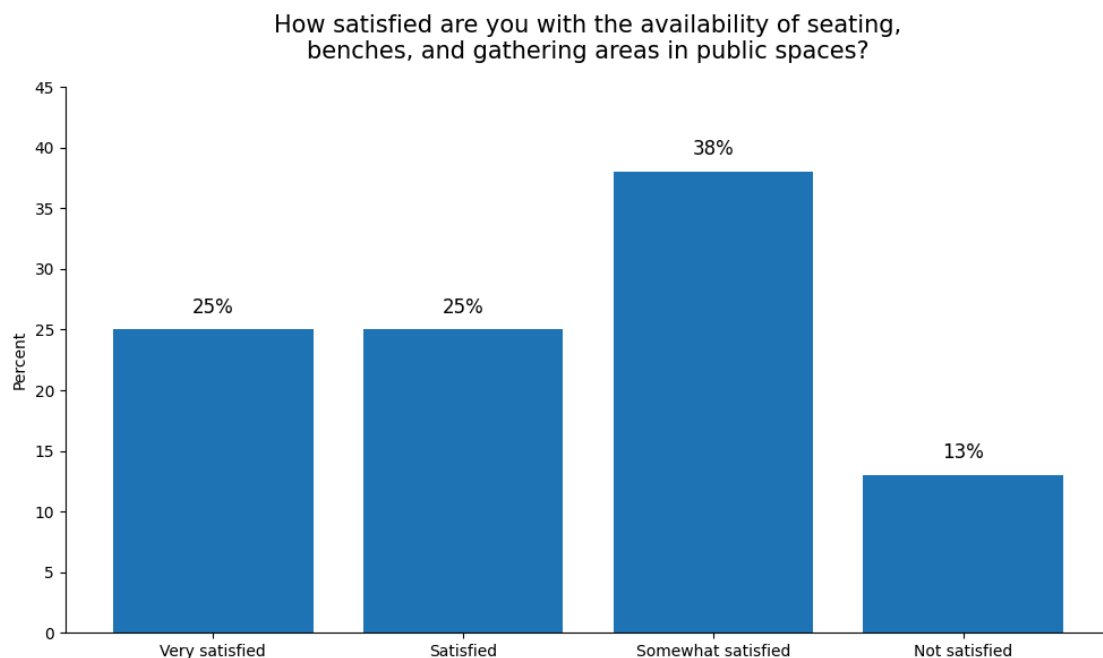

This week in DOVER HISTORY



The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

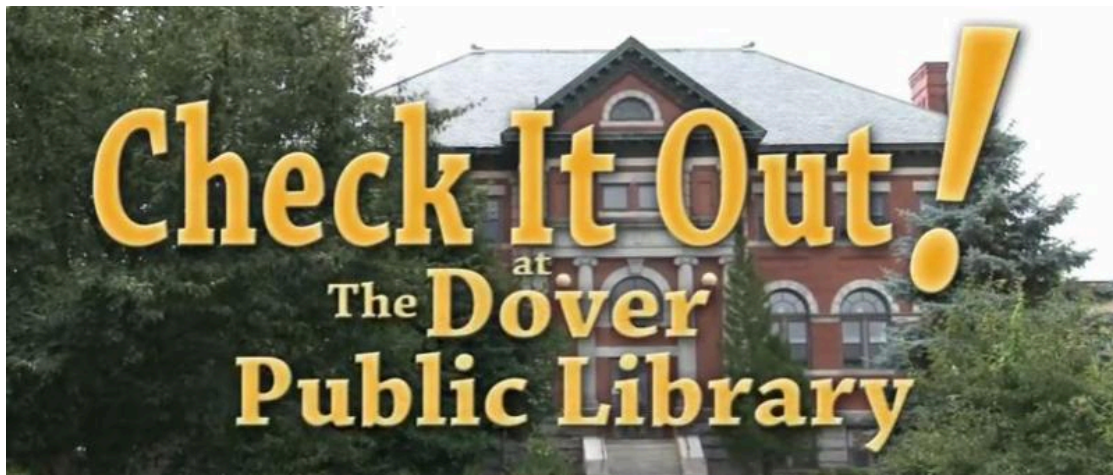

May 31, 1775 — Madbury was incorporated as a town on this day, seven years after it had been set off from Dover. At the time, Madbury had a population of 677. The incorporation reflected how large early Dover once was. Dover's original boundaries included several areas that later became separate communities as settlement spread and local residents sought their own town government. Madbury had earlier been connected to Dover and Durham, and its name is believed to come from Modbury, England.

June 3, 1775 — Dover chose a local Committee of Safety and voted that the committee should follow the recommendations of New Hampshire's Provincial Congress. The town also voted that Dover residents should conform to those same recommendations. The vote came at a tense moment. The battles of Lexington and Concord had taken place only weeks earlier, and New Hampshire communities were preparing for the possibility of war. Committees of Safety became an important part of that effort, helping local communities organize, communicate and respond while colonial authority was breaking down. New Hampshire's Provincial Congress, meeting in Exeter, was also working to organize the colony's military response and support the larger patriot cause.

June 3, 1788 — Elisha Thomas was executed in Dover for the murder of Capt. Peter Drown of New Durham. Drown had been killed the previous February after trying to break up a drunken fight at a tavern in New Durham. Thomas, a Revolutionary War veteran, was convicted and hanged in Dover on June 3. It was the first execution in Strafford County, and it drew a large crowd from Dover and surrounding towns. The scaffold was built near the foot of the hill leading from Central Street (now Central Avenue) toward the Cochecho River, on land later enclosed within the yard of the Cocheco Print Works. Public executions were still treated as civic spectacles in the 18th century, often drawing people from miles around. This one also connected two chapters of local history: Dover's role as the county seat for Strafford County and the later rise of the Cocheco mills along the riverfront, where the execution site was remembered long after the event itself. June, 1792 — The New Hampshire Legislature met in Dover's newly completed courthouse, briefly making Dover the state capital. The courthouse, built in 1791, stood on Central Avenue, near the site later occupied by a gas station. Dover served as the capital for one year, and the Legislature met there that June. The courthouse also became an important legal center. Some of New Hampshire's best-known lawyers argued cases there, including Daniel Webster, Jeremiah Mason, Ichabod Bartlett and Jeremiah Smith. Webster, who lived in Portsmouth for part of his early legal career, was said to ride by horseback through Newington and across the Piscataqua River bridge before continuing to Dover. Along the way, he would meet William King Atkinson at Leighton's Hill, and the two would ride together to the courthouse, where they might spend the day as friendly rivals in fierce courtroom battles. The United States District Court also met in Dover for a time, with Judge John Sullivan presiding. The courthouse was later sold in 1845 and converted into tenements. By the 1920s, the site had become part of a changing downtown landscape, eventually associated with a garage and gas station. At the time, New Hampshire did not yet have a permanent capital. The Legislature met in several communities before Concord was chosen as the permanent seat of state government in

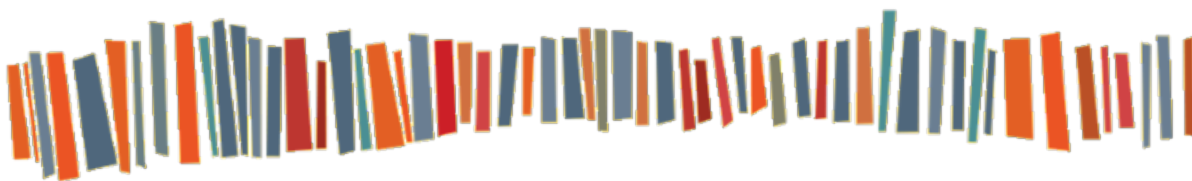

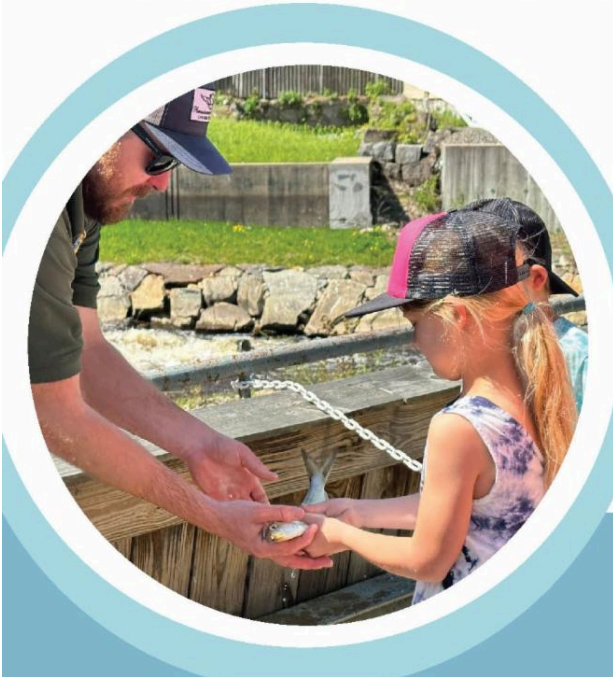

Dover Mental Health Alliance to host Community ACEs training June 10

The Dover Mental Health Alliance will host an educational training workshop on Community ACEs from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Wednesday, June 10, at the Dover Police Department, 46 Chestnut St.

The workshop will include a review of local data and a hands-on training component focused on identifying Community ACEs in Dover and learning about evidence-based models to address them.
