

DHS athletic complex enters construction phase

Groundbreaking ceremony set for Dec. 3

The Dover High athletics complex project will enter the construction phase in the coming weeks, beginning with a groundbreaking ceremony on Wednesday, Dec. 3, announced members of the Joint Building Committee for the

"We're not waiting for spring," said Michelle Clancy, the School Board's representative on the JBC. "We're kicking off and getting the action started now."

The JBC met Nov. 5 to review bid proposals, finalize contracts, and authorize the expenditure of \$15,941,460, the guaranteed maximum price provided by the JBC's project construction manager, Eckman Construction, Inc.

"Bids came in better than we expected, which allows us to do a little more for a little less and still come in under budget," said Fergus Cullen, JBC chair and city councilor.

In June, the City Council authorized up to \$18 million for the project, which includes about \$2 million allocated for design and contingency costs.

The final scope of work authorized by the JBC includes two synthetic turf playing fields: one at Dunaway Field and the other at the reimagined baseball field. Dunaway Field's location will shift slightly, and the baseball field will be rotated and expanded to create a second multisport field in the outfield.

"This second field replaces the field we lost with the construction of the new high school and adds hundreds of uses per year to the facility, said Linnea Nemeth, the JBC's City Council representative. "Dover will no longer be a field-poor community."

The project includes replacing the rubberized track, grandstands, and lights around Dunaway Field. There will be a new concessions and bathrooms building, an athletics equipment storage barn, and a 25-space parking lot accessed from Bellamy Road, which includes accessible parking spaces and a pick-up/drop-off area, neither of which existed previously.

Five site sub-contractors participated in the bidding process conducted by Eckman Construction, with four firms submitting bids ranging from \$10,047,460 to \$11,140,000 for site work. Eckman Construction selected the low bidder, David W. White Sports Construction of Bow, which also built the field at Dover's St. Thomas Aquinas High School in 2020. They have also constructed fields around the state, including Phillips Exeter Academy, Manchester Memorial High School, Trinity High School, Dartmouth College, and Southern New Hampshire University, among many other schools and municipalities, according to the JBC.

JBC members attribute the successful bidding process to having a desirable project from a contractor's perspective and soliciting bids at the right time. A second significant area of savings came from the JBC's decision to opt for a more basic pre-manufactured building for the new facilities building that will replace the current dilapidated structure. This saved more than \$500,000 from the original design.

One decision that has not been finalized is whether to include lighting for the baseball/multisport field. The committee is considering three options: include lights, don't include lights, or install deep base foundations and electric conduit now,

allowing towers to be added at a later date.

"Retrofitting towers at the field isn't feasible from a construction or cost perspective," said JBC member Ronan O'Doherty. "It's now or never."

Dover's synthetic baseball field will be New Hampshire's third, according to the JBC. The others are at Dartmouth College and Gill Stadium in Manchester. The creative configuration allows two 60-foot youth softball or baseball games to be played simultaneously when the 90-foot baseball field and multisport field are not in use.

"The Dover baseball community would rather have a synthetic field they know will always be playable than a grass field that is unplayable much of the spring," said Craig Flynn, School Board representative on the JBC.

The JBC and school officials have scheduled a formal ground-breaking ceremony for 3 p.m. on Wednesday, Dec. 3. Fencing around the project site is expected to go up in advance. Demolition of everything above grade — grandstands, the concessions buildings, and fencing — will happen soon after. The project has received its alteration of terrain permit from the state, allowing the removal of the track and excavation to begin.

"Our goal remains having a field ready for play in the fall of 2026," said JBC member Ernie Clark. "We can't promise that, but getting underway before winter sets in gives us our best chance."

School Board budget review continues Monday

Superintendent presented budget overview this week

The School Board will continue its fiscal year 2027 budget review at a Monday, Nov. 24 workshop.

The workshop will include an overview of the school district's budget book and walking School Board members and the public through the budget materials.

The School Board <u>received a high-level overview</u> of the budget at a Nov. 17 special meeting, where Superintendent Christine Boston and Chief Financial Officer Michael Limanni reviewed the school district's budget process and the drivers behind the estimated revenue and expenditures of the budget. This review also included estimated school enrollment numbers and the new position requests for the 2026/2027 school year.

The budget workshops, continuing on Mondays in November, December and early January, will drill down in detail. The School Board plans to adopt its budget on Monday, Jan. 12, with a backup date of Tuesday, Jan. 13. By ordinance, the School Board must adopt its budget annually by Jan. 15, so it can be included in the citywide budget that the City Manager must present to the City Council by Feb. 15.

The School Board's budget meetings and workshops are posted to the <u>FY2027 Budget</u> <u>Revealed webpage</u> along with associated documents.

The <u>Nov. 25 workshop</u> will be televised on DoverTV and <u>online</u>, where it will be available on demand.

Phishing scam targets SNAP users


Attorney General John M. Formella and New Hampshire Health and Human Services Commissioner Lori A. Weaver are warning Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) participants about a new phishing scam involving fraudulent phone calls, text messages, and emails seeking personal information.

"We would urge anyone receiving this type of suspicious communication to hang up, not respond, and to report it," said Attorney General Formella.

The New Hampshire Department of Justice Consumer Protection and Antitrust Bureau has received initial reports, forwarded by the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), of callers impersonating DHHS officials and claiming that a recipient's EBT card will be "restricted" and SNAP benefits held back unless the consumer verifies their Social Security number, date of birth, or other sensitive information.

"Scammers often try to create a false sense of urgency," said Commissioner Weaver. "We urge SNAP recipients to be cautious, protect their personal information, and contact DHHS if they receive a suspicious call."

These calls, texts, or emails do not come from DHHS, the EBT vendor, or any official government agency. DHHS does not "restrict"



or "hold" SNAP benefits. Consumers who receive a call like this should hang up

immediately and call 1-844-ASK-DHHS to make a report.

How the Scam Works:

- The caller uses spoofed phone numbers, including toll-free numbers, to appear legitimate.
- The message falsely claims there is an issue with the consumer's EBT card or SNAP benefits.
- The scammer then pressures the recipient to "confirm" their identity or risk losing benefits.

What Consumers Should Do:

- Do not respond to unsolicited requests for Social Security numbers, dates of birth, PINs, or EBT card numbers.
- Report suspicious calls to the DHHS Customer Service Center at 1-844-ASK-DHHS (1-844-275-3447).
- Monitor your EBT card for unauthorized transactions and report them immediately if discovered.
- File a complaint with the NH Department of Justice, Consumer Protection Bureau, by calling 1-888-468-4454 or <u>visiting their website</u>.

- Shaws Lane will be closed in both directions between Garrison Road and Tideview Drive beginning at 8:30 a.m., and lasting about 15 minutes, to accommodate the start of the race;





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.


Nov. 26, 1855 — Dover held elections for ward officers under its new city charter, marking the community's first steps into formal city government after more than two centuries as a town. In June that year, the New Hampshire Legislature granted Dover a city charter, which the voters formally accepted at a town meeting on Sept. 1, 1855. This changed Dover's status from town to city, replacing the old town-meeting-and-selectmen model with a mayor—council form of government. Under the new charter, legislative power was vested in a two-chamber city council consisting of a Board of Aldermen and a Common Council; the first election under the charter provided for six aldermen and 18 Common Council members, elected from the city's wards. The ward-officer elections held on Nov. 26, 1855, were part of putting this new city structure into operation, as Dover transitioned from a colonial-era town government founded in 1623 to a modern industrial city government.

Nov. 25, 1939 — The Dover High School Football team trampled Portland High School in a game held on a bitterly cold day. The Green Wave would end up with a shutout, beating Portland's team 14-0. Under the headline "Dover Air Raids are Fatal to Portland," the Portland Press Herald would write of the game, "Football of the Granite State brand proved too much for the Pine Tree type here this afternoon as a sterling Green Wave eleven from Dover High turned back Portland High 14-0. Both clubs went scoreless in the first half, Dover tallying its scores in the third and fourth periods, both via Portland's one weak defensive link in the entire ball game." The newspaper would go on to report that the frigid weather kept the crowd to "a meager 1,500."

Nov. 25, 1943 — A 16-year-old boy, Michael Bennett of Pierce Street, was accidentally shot by US Marines, who had mistaken him for a Marine who had escaped from the Portsmouth Naval Prison. The boy was treated at the hospital and sent home to recover. US Marines had led a massive manhunt that focused on Dover, with a group of more than

250 Marines, state and local police, and the Coast Guard. They were looking for four Marines who had escaped the prison. During the search, Dover was surrounded by armed guards and Army sentry dogs. The escaped Marines were eventually tracked down and returned to the prison, but not before being fired at several times at various locations.

Nov. 29, 1998 — Thousands of spectators visited downtown Dover for the annual holiday parade, which was led by Grand Marshal Thom Hindle, Dover's Citizen of the Year that year. Then Gov. Jeanne Shaheen also marched in the parade along with several local officials, including then Mayor Wil Boc. Businesses, civic groups, and schools showcased floats with variations of that year's theme, "Celebrating the Spirit of the Holidays." Fatherhood from an Iron Lung and lessons learned from a son

In 1955, Bruce Dodd contracted polio and the lives of his wife and four young children were forever changed.

On Monday, Nov. 24, join Dover Public Library as local author Douglas Dodd recounts the remarkable story of his father, who spent 21 years in an iron lung, but refused to let it limit or define him. The program takes place at 6:30 p.m. in Room 306 of the McConnell Center.

Bruce Dodd defied limitations and was a devoted father, mentor, and unwavering source of inspiration. In Douglas's book "Our Father, Who Art In An Iron Lung", he chronicles his father's journey, sacrifices, the resilience of his family, and the profound impact his father had on those around him. The deeply moving account explores not only Bruce's life but also the challenges and triumphs of the entire family as they navigated disability, hardship, and their own personal trials. From childhood memories to life-altering struggles as an adult – including Douglas's own experiences raising a child with Down Syndrome and almost becoming paralyzed himself – this story is a testament to the enduring power of love, family, determination, and a reminder that, even in the face of overwhelming obstacles, a meaningful and influential life is possible.

Douglas Dodd is a retired home builder living with his wife in a converted warehouse in Dover, New Hampshire. Although retired, his children will always find reasons for him to bring his tools over to their houses to fix or build something. When he's not working on family properties or his own home, Douglass still continues to hike in the White Mountains and will always find time to see his three daughters and three grandsons.

Dover CrimeLine is a community partnership between residents and the Dover Police Department that allows people to anonymously share information about criminal activity.



Leaf collection continues through Dec. 5

Fall leaf curbside collection, which began last week, will continue, Monday through Friday, through Dec. 5.

Bagged leaves will be picked up by Waste Management on the same scheduled day as curbside trash and recycling. Please note that pickup is delayed by one day on Thursday, Nov. 27 and Friday, Nov. 28, due to the Thanksgiving holiday.

Leaves must be placed curbside in biodegradable paper leaf bags. No brush will be accepted. Paper bags can be purchased at local hardware or home improvement stores.

Grass clippings, leaves, brush and yard waste are also accepted at the Recycling Center during regular operating hours, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. They are also open on Sundays from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. through Dec. 7.

Residents bringing bagged leaves and brush to the Recycling Center must dump them on the ground separately at the Recycling Center's leaf and brush sections. They may not be left in their bags. The collected leaf and brush materials go into a composting operation that has no means or mechanism for removing contaminated items.
