Annual Holiday Parade steps off Sunday

The annual Dover Holiday Parade will return to downtown on Sunday, Nov. 30, bringing music, floats and a visit from Santa Claus as the city kicks off the holiday season.

The parade begins at 3 p.m. and will follow its traditional route along Central Avenue (NH Route 108), beginning at the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce, 550 Central Ave., and finishing at Cleary Cleaners, 120 Central Ave.

This year's theme is "Christmas Carols," and organizers say spectators can expect plenty of seasonal spirit from the roughly 60 participating groups and more than a dozen themed floats.

D.F. Richard Energy, recognized as a longtime supporter of the community, will serve as this year's grand marshal.

3:30 p.m.

Sunday (through Dec. 7): 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The parade will also honor several community members, including 2024 Citizen of the Year Sean O'Connell, 2025 Citizen of the Year Beth Fisher, and Woodman Museum representative Jonathan Nichols, the 2025 Champion of the Arts.

Santa Claus will close out the parade with his traditional appearance.

Organizers encourage attendees to arrive early and thank the many local businesses supporting this year's parade, including platinum sponsor Dover Honda, gold sponsors Flynn Insurance and Hopkins Enterprises, and numerous silver and community sponsors.

The Dover Holiday Parade is organized by the Cochecho Friends, a volunteer committee that includes Nicole Andrews, Robert Carrier, Angela Carter, Aaron Cronkrite, Lori Nollet, Michelle Routhouska, Mayor-elect Dennis Shanahan, and Samantha Tukey.

Road closures, traffic restrictions in place for Holiday Parade

Dover Police Chief David A. Terlemezian announces the following road closures and parking restrictions for the Dover Holiday Parade.

On Sunday, Nov. 30, Central Avenue will be closed to all traffic from 2:45 to 4:45 p.m. from the intersection of Chestnut Street to the intersection of Stark Avenue and East Watson Street. This closure includes much of the downtown area. Temporary traffic detours will be in effect, but motorists not coming to watch, participate, or visit the downtown are encouraged to avoid the downtown area entirely.

Additional street closures will be in effect from 11:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. to accommodate parade staging and setup. These include:


- Sixth Street, between Horne Street and Central Avenue;
- Maple Street, between Sixth and Hough streets;
- Grove Street, between Fifth and Hough streets;
- Mount Vernon Street, between Sixth and Milk streets.

Parking restrictions will be posted on Sixth Street between Horne Street and Central Avenue beginning at 9 a.m. on Sunday, Nov. 30, and in other locations where necessary along the parade route. Parking is allowed on most of the parade route, but motorists cannot move their vehicles during the Central Avenue closure.

Dover Police is coordinating with CSX Transportation railways for the temporary suspension of freight trains at the downtown crossings to accommodate the event. Amtrak Downeaster passenger train service will not be interrupted.

24-hour closure of Locust and Hale streets at intersection starts Dec. 3

Locust Street to reopen Dec. 10; Hale Street Dec. 17

Locust Street and Hale Street will be closed at the intersection 24 hours a day starting on Wednesday, Dec. 3 for utility work. All vehicle traffic will be detoured around the intersection.

Locust Street is expected to reopen by Dec. 10, with Hale Street expected to reopen on

Dec. 17.

Locust Street will be closed on the southern part of the Hale Street intersection. Access to the McConnell Center will be from Chestnut Street. Access to Hale Street will be from Central Avenue.

Inbound Locust Street traffic will be detoured on Kirkland Street to Central Avenue. Outbound Locust Street traffic will be detoured on Saint Thomas Street to Atkinson Street. Flaggers will be stationed at major intersections to assist with traffic flow.

A section of parking spaces on Locust and Kirkland streets will be posted for no parking from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. A section of spaces on Hale Street will be posted for no parking 24 hours a day for equipment staging.

The McConnell Center/Dover Public Library parking lot will be open and accessible from the Chestnut Street side of Locust Street. The City Hall parking lot on Hale Street will be accessible from Central Avenue.

The closure is to allow the excavation of the intersection to move utilities and install drainage infrastructure as part of a <u>drainage improvement project</u>. Once the contractor clears the intersection, work will continue on private property toward the intersection of Kirkland and Academy streets.



City Council to hold special meeting for warming center budget amendment

CIP workshop follows special meeting

The City Council will hold a special meeting at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, Dec. 3, to introduce a fiscal year 2026 budget amendment for the City of Dover's portion to help fund a permanent warming center on Strafford County land in Dover. The City Council is expected to refer the resolution to a pubic hearing and vote at its Wednesday, Dec. 10 meeting.

The resolution would appropriate \$1,698,878 for the emergency warming center that the Strafford County Commissioners propose to build at the former humane society site near the county jail. The county would supply the land at no cost, and the tri-cities of Dover,

Rochester and Somersworth would divide the estimated \$3.5 million project cost in proportion to each city's portion of the combined equalized assessed property value. Rochester would contribute \$1,316,593, and Somersworth would contribute \$484,593. Dover's portion would be partly offset by the planned sale of the current warming center at 30 Willand Drive in Somersworth after the conclusion of the winter season, as well as the proceeds from a recent sale of city-owned property in Rollinsford.

The Dover City Council discussed the county warming center proposal at its Oct. 8 and Oct. 22 meetings.

Immediately following the special meeting, the City Council <u>will hold a workshop</u> on the FY2027-2032 Capital Improvements Program. The <u>CIP was introduced</u> to the City Council and Planning Board in October. The Council is expected to vote on the CIP resolutions at its Wednesday, Dec. 10 meeting.

Both the special meeting and the CIP workshop will be held in City Hall's Council Chambers, which will be televised <u>online</u> and on DoverTV.

City Council, School Board hold joint fiscal meeting Dec. 3

The City Council and School Board <u>will meet jointly</u> on Wednesday, Dec. 3 to discuss the development of the fiscal year 2027 budget and receive a preliminary calculation of the FY2027 tax cap.

The joint meeting begins at 6 p.m. in City Hall's Council Conference Room and will be televised online and on DoverTV.

School Board budget review continues

The School Board will continue its fiscal year 2027 budget development <u>at a workshop</u> on Monday, Dec. 1.

At this week's <u>budget workshop</u> on Nov. 24, School Board members reviewed the FY27 budget book. Dover School District Chief Financial Officer Michael Limmani walked the School Board through the document. Limanni said many of the numbers included in the budget are the district's best conservative estimates and will be further refined over the coming weeks.

The budget book includes a summary of estimated revenues and expenses, summaries by function and programs, employee compensation by school and employee categories, as well as detailed budget line items. The budget book is available on the city's FY2027 Budget Revealed webpage, along with video recordings and other School Board budget documents. The Dover School District also has a budget page.

School Board budget workshops will continue on Monday, Dec. 8, and Monday, Jan. 6, with a budget adoption date slated for Monday, Jan. 12. The public is welcome to provide input at any of the School Board's meetings and workshops or by emailing the SchoolBoard.

City of Dover to hold 40th annual Christmas tree lighting Dec. 5

Dover Recreation will present the City of Dover's 40th annual Christmas tree lighting on Friday, Dec. 5, at 6 p.m. at Henry Law Park, continuing one of Dover's longest-running holiday traditions.

This year's program will begin with remarks from Recreation Director Kevin Hebert, followed by a welcome from Mayor Bob Carrier. The Dover Middle School Chorus will lead attendees in seasonal songs before former Mayor Andy Galt switches on the tree's lights. Local vocalist Nancy Gurick will also lead the crowd in song, and the program will conclude with closing remarks from Hebert.

The city's holiday tree, donated by Carol and Alan Brown of Rochester, was installed at Henry Law Park on Nov. 26 with assistance from crews with Dover Community Services and SavATree.

This year's lighting also features the added support of Light Up Dover, a community effort led by the Dover City Lights Committee in partnership with the nonprofit Communitively. The group helped secure the holiday tree, raised funds for new lights and ornaments, and coordinated volunteers for decorating.

The event is free and open to the public.

Flag raised at Dover City Hall in honor of Native American Heritage Month

Mayor Robert Carrier, Mayor-elect Dennis Shanahan, City Councilor Debra Hackett, Committee for Racial Equity and Inclusion Chair José Feliciano, fellow member Whitney Carrier, and former member Kathleen Blake joined Denise Pouliot, the Sag8moskwa (head female speaker), and Paul Pouliot, the Sag8mo (head male speaker/grand chief) of the Cowasuck Band of the Pennacook-Abenaki People in raising the Cowasuck Band flag at Dover City Hall for Native American Heritage Month on Nov. 24.

Following the raising of the flag, Denise Pouliot, read the City of Dover's land acknowledgement statement: "This event takes place at Cochecho (CO-chi-co) on

N'dakinna (n-DA-ki-na), now called Dover, New Hampshire, which is the unceded traditional ancestral homeland of the Abenaki (a-BEN-a-ki), Pennacook and Wabanaki Peoples, past and present. We acknowledge and honor with gratitude the land, waterways, living beings, and the Aln8bak (Al-nuh-bak), the people who have stewarded N'dakinna (n-DA-ki-na) for many millennia."

The flag will fly in front of City Hall through Monday, Dec. 1.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.



Dec. 3, 1798 — Dover voters approved a measure stating that winter road clearing, referred to then as "breaking out" the roads, would be treated the same as any other highway work. In practical terms, this meant that residents who performed snow-clearing labor would be compensated just as they were for routine road maintenance during the warmer months. In the late 18th century, Dover was still a rural New England town where most public works were carried out by residents rather than by a dedicated municipal workforce. Townspeople were often required to perform a certain amount of road labor each year or pay an equivalent tax.

Nov. 30, 1847 — The Strafford Bank moved from its old location near the Dover Hotel to Central Square.

Dec. 1, 1999 — At a ceremony on this day, the Dover Housing Authority dedicated its community center as the Seymour Osman Community Center, naming it after the longtime supporter of a variety of social programs at DHA. Osman was at the ceremony, which was attended by more than 100 people. Osman, who moved to Dover in 1945, was president of United Tanners from 1963 until his retirement in 1978. His community activities include working with groups including the United Way, Heart Fund, Little League and Temple Israel. Osman's received the Rotary's Paul Harris medal for his work with the underprivileged, and the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce's 1991 Citizen of the Year. In 1967 he won the Christian and Jew Award for Brotherhood by the Interfaith Religious Council in Dover. Osman also helped form the Dover Business and Industrial Development Authority and was a member of the Wentworth-Douglass Hospital Board of Trustees.

Nov. 30, 2001 — The Dover City Council approved a resolution formally dedicating the Dover Transportation Station to former downtown mills owner and train aficionado Joseph Sawtelle, recognizing his contributions to the local economy and numerous charitable organizations. Sawtelle, who died in 2000, donated the land where the train station now sits. He was also responsible for the rehabilitation of more than 700,000 square feet of mill space into office space, adding more than 1,700 jobs in Dover.

How to reduce home cooking fire risks

With the holiday season upon us, the New Hampshire State Fire Marshal's Office is joining with Dover Fire and Rescue and the Red Cross Northern New England Region to urge all Granite State families to practice fire safety while cooking in the kitchen.

This week, leaders from the organizations spoke to the news media about tips to keep families and homes fire-free this holiday season. The event concluded with a live demonstration, where those in attendance witnessed how fast cooking fires can spread. "Home cooking fires are a leading cause of residential fires in New Hampshire," said New Hampshire State Fire Marshal Sean P. Toomey. "Nationally, cooking fires spike during the holiday season. This is a great time to collaborate on sharing key home cooking fire safety messaging when so many people are busy in their kitchens. Better awareness can help bring home cooking fire incidents down year-round."

With so much going on during the holidays, it is easier to become distracted. Left unattended, food can burn and cause fires. Clothing and other combustibles too close to the stovetop can also ignite.

"The City of Dover Fire and Rescue would like to stress the importance of safe cooking practices while families are preparing their holiday meals," said City of Dover Fire and Rescue Deputy Chief Brendan Driscoll. "Here are a few reminders: do not leave food on the stove unattended, keep clutter away from any hot surfaces, and fires involving cooking oils should not be extinguished with water. If you have a fire at your home, leave quickly and call 911 from a safe location. We wish everyone a safe and happy holiday season."

Follow these additional safety tips for holiday cooking:

- Never leave the kitchen when food is cooking on the stovetop. Frying and sautéing need constant attention.
- When roasting a turkey, stay home and check it regularly.
- Use timers to keep track of longer cooking times.
- Keep flammable items, like oven mitts, wooden utensils, food wrappers and towels, at least 3 feet from the stove.
- Avoid wearing long sleeves or loose fabrics near heat sources.
- · Keep a lid nearby when cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the

- pan, turn off the burner, and let the pan cool completely.
- For oven fires, turn off the heat and keep the door closed until the fire is out. Open the door cautiously, standing to the side. Call the fire department if unsure.
- Keep children and pets at least 3 feet away from cooking areas. Place hot foods and liquids away from counter and table edges.
- The usage of turkey fryers with oil is discouraged due to serious burn risks. Safer options include buying a fried turkey from a store or using an oil-free fryer.

"With multiple dishes being prepared while entertaining guests, it is easy to get distracted," said Stephanie Couturier, regional CEO, Red Cross Northern New England Region. "It is vital to stay attentive in the kitchen — and know what to do if a fire starts. The Red Cross responds to nearly 20% more home fires during November and December than other times of the year. It is important to have working smoke alarms and practice a fire escape plan with your family."

Home fires are the nation's most frequent disaster, claiming seven lives (mostly children and the elderly) every day across the country, and injuring more than 30. Working smoke alarms save lives, doubling chances of survival. The Red Cross may be able to help anyone who cannot afford to purchase smoke alarms or is physically unable to install one. The Red Cross will follow up to schedule a smoke alarm installation and fire safety education appointment.
