CIP before joint session of Council, Planning Board

FY27-32 proposal gets first look Oct. 15

City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. will present the proposed FY2027-2032 Capital Improvements Program (CIP) to the City Council and Planning Board at <u>a joint workshop</u> on Wednesday, Oct. 15. The joint session begins at 7 p.m. in City Hall's Council Conference Room.

After it is presented, the Planning Board and City Council will conduct their own review of the proposed CIP at subsequent meetings. The Planning Board reviews the CIP to ensure the proposed projects are based upon priorities established in the Master Plan. The Planning Board will hold a public hearing and CIP discussion at its Tuesday, Oct. 28 meeting.

Following the Planning Board's input, the City Council will hold its review and public hearings. The City Council's CIP adoption process includes three resolutions: adopting the six-year document, approving FY27 capital reserve fund appropriations for non-debt financed projects, and authorizing appropriation and bonding for FY27 debt-financed projects. The CIP's first-year projects and appropriations will become part of the FY27 municipal budget that City Manager Joyal will present to the City Council in February.

The CIP prioritizes all capital spending of \$25,000 or more for

items with a useful life of three years or longer. It includes cost estimates, recommended time schedules to complete projects, and financing methods, which include debt financing, the annual operating budget, capital reserve funds, and grant funding. The CIP is the first step in preparing the annual municipal budget.

The <u>Capital Improvements Program webpage</u> will be updated with the proposed FY2027-2032 CIP after the Oct. 15 presentation. Physical copies will be available at the Planning Department's office in City Hall and the Dover Public Library, which is temporarily located in the McConnell Center.


City offices closed on Columbus Day

City holding meeting on upgrades to Central Avenue water main Oct. 23

Next year, the City of Dover plans to replace a section of the aging Central Avenue water main between the Garrison Hill water tank and Broadway, including along Abbey Sawyer Memorial Drive that leads to the top of Garrison Hill. Construction is slated to begin in spring 2026 and conclude by that fall.

City staff will hold a public informational meeting about the project on Thursday, Oct. 23, 2025, in City Hall's Auditorium, beginning at 6 p.m.



NHDOT seeks input on Ten Year Plan

On Thursday, Oct. 23, the Governor's Advisory on Intermodal Transportation (GACIT) is holding four public hearings in the Seacoast area, including one in Dover, on the New Hampshire Department of Transportation's draft 2027-2036 Ten Year Plan. These are among many public hearings held across the state. The draft plan is available at https://www.dot.nh.gov/projects-plans-and-programs/ten-year-plan.

The purpose of these hearings is to receive public comments/testimony on transportation projects and priorities included in the draft plan, as recommended by NHDOT to GACIT. Those not able to attend the meetings can submit written testimony within 10 days of the completion of the public hearings.

The City Council appoints citizens to boards and commissions from recommendations of its Appointments Committee, which meets regularly to review applications.

Plan allows the state to participate in federally supported transportation improvement projects as well as to outline projects and programs funded with state transportation dollars, according to the NHDOT. State law requires the NHDOT to propose a plan every two years.



Absentee ballots available for Municipal Election

Absentee ballots are now available for the Nov. 4, 2025 Municipal Election. Voters may apply for absentee ballots from the City Clerk's Office through Monday, Nov. 3, 2025, in the following ways: in-person at the City Clerk's Office, by mail, email, or fax.

Applications for an absentee ballot are <u>available online</u> and at the City Clerk's Office. <u>State law</u> allows absentee voting for voters who can't attend the polls on Election Day due to religious observance, physical disability, or employment, among other reasons.

A new state law, <u>RSA:17-c Verification of Absentee Ballot Applicant</u>, became effective on Sept. 30, 2025. This law requires voters requesting an absentee ballot to verify their identity by one of the following methods:

 Include a copy of their qualifying photo identification with their absentee ballot application;

- Personally present a qualifying photo identification to the City Clerk; or,
- Include a notarized signature on the absentee ballot application.

Qualifying photo identifications must meet the requirements of state law RSA 659:13, II(a).

The City Clerk's Office is in Dover City Hall's Customer Service Center on the ground floor. 

The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information <u>located here</u>.

Oct. 15, 1693 — Around 10 a.m., many residents of Dover heard a deep rumbling sound coming from the northeast. The noise was so strong that people believed it to be a significant earthquake. This particular tremor was one of several recorded in the late 1600s throughout the region, as the early settlements of New Hampshire were still small and vulnerable. While there are no reports of major damage, the event was memorable enough to be noted in the colonial records.

Oct. 16, 1746 — The governor declared the day to be one of public fasting and prayer in response to two serious concerns, the arrival of a French fleet off the New Hampshire coast and a poor harvest that year. At the time, such proclamations were common in the American colonies, reflecting both religious devotion and the uncertainties of frontier life. The late 1600s and early 1700s were marked by tension between England and France, whose conflict often spilled into their North American colonies. A French naval presence near New Hampshire alarmed Dover's early settlers, who were vulnerable to attacks along the coast. The weak harvest only deepened the community's anxiety, as food shortages were a real threat during harsh New England winters. Days of fasting and prayer were meant to unite townspeople in reflection and supplication.

Oct. 10, 1854 — The mills of the Cocheco Manufacturing Co. suspended operations due to the scarcity of water. The streams and rivers were the lowest in many years.

Oct. 13, 1855 — The Piscataqua Ferry Company, which would operate between Dover Point to Newington, was organized on this day with an investment of \$2,000.

Oct. 15, 1931 — All Dover businesses closed for several hours on this day during funeral services for former Mayor Arthur Whittemore. Mayor Jewett Chesley, by proclamation, ordered the offices of City Hall closed for the afternoon, as well. Whittemore's funeral was attended by many local and state dignitaries, including all former mayors living at that time. Throughout his life, Whittemore had been a prominent champion for Dover.

Seacoast drinking water commission presents results of interconnection study at Oct. 15 meeting

The Seacoast Commission on Long-Term Goals and Requirements for Drinking Water will hold a public meeting on Wednesday, Oct. 15, 2025, at 6 p.m. to discuss the Seacoast emergency interconnection study and the evaluation of water supply and demand for Seacoast communities. The meeting will be held at 222 International Dr., Suite 175 on the Pease Tradeport in Portsmouth at the Department of Environmental Services' office.

The commission was created by state law <u>RSA 485-F:6</u> to plan for the long-term goals and requirements for the region's drinking water. The legislation requires annual interim reports by Nov. 1, with a final report of its findings and any recommendations for proposed legislation by Nov. 1, 2029.

Dover Rotary donates HVAC system to End 68 Hours of Hunger

Volunteers recently gathered at the End 68 Hours of Hunger building in Dover to celebrate the installation of a new mini-split HVAC system funded by the Rotary Club of Dover.

Located next to St. Paul's Methodist Church on Cataract Avenue, the brick building serves as a hub for accepting, sorting, and packing nonperishable food for delivery to local schools and organizations to help address childhood food insecurity in Dover.

Before the installation, the building, leased by End 68 Hours of Hunger from the church, had no heating or cooling system, forcing volunteers to work in sweltering or freezing conditions. Project organizer and Rotarian Melissa Lesniak said the new system will allow volunteers to work comfortably throughout the year.

"We look forward to a successful and fun season helping address food insecurity in the local area in a more comfortable setting," Lesniak said.

Lesniak thanked the Rotary Club of Dover, Friends of End 68 Hours of Hunger, founder Claire Bloom, Executive Director Lauren Kolifrath, Board President Keith Launchbury, Roland Lapointe and Andrew Lepage of D.F. Richard Energy, Nick Wentworth of Wentworth Electric, and Steve Smith of Admiral Plumbing & Heating for their contributions.

Conservation tips

Residents are encouraged to:

- Limit outdoor watering, especially during the hottest parts of the day.
- Use commercial car washes, which are more water-efficient than washing vehicles at home.
- Fix leaks, including faucets and toilets, which can waste thousands of gallons annually.
- Reduce indoor use by shortening showers, turning off faucets while brushing teeth and running dishwashers and washing machines only when full.
