

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Waterfront blasting operations resume week of Oct. 15

Crews from Severino Trucking Company and Maine Drilling and Blasting will resume blasting operations on Dover's waterfront development site the week of Oct. 15, 2018.

The blasting site is the area known as "the bluff," a steep area of ledge that borders River Street. The ledge is being excavated as part of the City's waterfront development project.

Although blasting operations are not loud, the ground within the vicinity of the blasting may tremble.

The five-acre bluff is part of the City's 12-acre waterfront parcel slated for development. The bluff's 3.7 acres of ledge will be excavated to street level to allow for more buildable land. The Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee, which oversees the project, recently selected Cathartes as the preferred developer for the project on the





Community Services and Eversource partner for Freon Appliance Disposal Day

Community Services has partnered with Eversource for free recycling of old household appliances containing Freon on Saturday, Oct. 13, 2018 at the Recycling Center on Mast Road.

Residents will be allowed to dispose of up to two Freon-based appliances during the disposal day during regular hours, 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Items allowed include refrigerators, freezers, dehumidifiers, and air conditioners. Residents will be required to complete a short form with their name, address, product make, model, and serial number. Recycling Center staff are required to cut the electric cords on all of the appliances to ensure they are not reused.

Eversource will reimburse the city for the disposal expense of all appliances collected.

This is a one-day event only.



Fall leaf collection begins in November

The City of Dover 2018 fall leaf collection will take place on the following weeks:

- Nov. 5-9
- Nov. 12-16
- Nov. 19-24
- Nov. 26-30

Bagged leaves will be picked up on the same day as trash and recycling.

Leaves must be placed curbside in biodegradable paper leaf bags. No brush will be accepted. Paper bags can be purchased at your local hardware or home improvement store.

Grass clippings, leaves, brush and yard waste are also accepted at the Recycling Center during regular operating hours, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Community Development Block Grant applications now available

The City of Dover Department of Planning and Community Development is now accepting applications from public service agencies, qualified individuals and eligible organizations for grants from the fiscal year 2020 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. The fiscal year spans July 1, 2019 to June 30, 2020.

Applications are available online at www.dover.nh.gov/government/city-operations/planning/ and at the Planning Department. The application submission deadline is 4 p.m. on Monday, Nov. 19, 2018, at the Planning Department, located at 288 Central Ave., Dover, NH 03820-4169.

CDBG workshops to provide an overview of the CDBG Program and specific application requirements will be held in Room 306 at the McConnell Center, 61 Locust St., on Thursday, Oct. 18, 2018, at 10:30 a.m. and 6 p.m. Attendance at the workshop is not a prerequisite for submission of an application. Unlike in previous years, interested parties may submit an application for the Public Service category and an application for the Public Facilities category, with some restrictions.

Incomplete or late applications are ineligible.

Eligible CDBG activities include, but are not limited to acquisition of property, development or improvement of public facilities, clearance or demolition, public services, and special economic development activities.

To be eligible for funding, certain requirements must be met, including but not limited to:

- Submission of a complete and timely application.
- Support the goals outlined in the city's Consolidated Plan.
- Meet one of the following HUD national objectives:
 1. Benefit low and moderate income people;
 2. Eliminate of slums and blight;
 3. Meet a particularly urgent community development need.

The City of Dover has been a CDBG entitlement community for over 25 years. The HUD program provides annual grants on a formula basis to entitled cities and counties to develop

viable urban communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment, and by expanding economic opportunities, principally for low and moderate income people. HUD awards grants to entitlement community grantees to carry out a wide range of community development activities directed toward revitalizing neighborhoods, economic development, and providing improved community facilities and services. Entitlement communities develop their own programs and funding priorities. The entitlement grant is expected to be available in the summer or fall of 2019. The amount to be received by the City of Dover has yet to be determined by Congress.



We Need to Talk: Mental Health at Dover High School

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. Oct. 12, 1648 - There was granted to Richard Waldron fifteen hundred trees, either oak or pine, for the accommodation of a saw mill which he intendeth shortly by God's permission to erect and set up at or upon the lower fall of the river Cochecho. The said Richard Waldron is to pay three pence per tree.



Oct. 18, 1649 - The Court being informed of a great misdemeanor committed by Edward Starbuck of Dover, with profession of Anabaptism, for which he is to be proceeded against at the next Court of Assistants, if

evidence can be prepared by that time, and it being very far for witnesses to travel to Boston at that season of the year, appointed Captain Thomas Wiggin and Mr. Edward Smith to take the testimony of the witnesses for the prosecution of Starbuck, whose offence, apparently, was the wearing of his hair beyond the statute length, "after the manner of ruffians and barbarous Indians," which had been decreed by the Court to be "sinful."



Oct. 15, 1693 - The General Assembly in ordering that every town in the Province should provide a schoolmaster for the supply of the town on penalty of ten pounds, exempted Dover during the war with the French and Indians from the provisions of the act. This exemption was doubtless in consequence of the desolation of the town in 1689, from which it had not yet sufficiently recovered to support the charge of a school.



Oct. 16, 1840 - Died, Moses Hodgdon, Esq. Counselor at Law, aged 66 - one of the oldest members of the Strafford County Bar, having commenced practice in 1801. He had represented Dover in the Legislature and at the time of his death was President of Strafford Bank and of the Savings Bank for the County of Strafford.



Oct. 13, 1855 - The Piscataqua Ferry Co. for carrying passengers from Dover Point to Newington was organized. Capital \$2,000.



Tickets now on sale for "Lives & Legends: Voices From the Museum"

On Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 20 and 21, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., the Woodman Museum, along with a cast of 40 actors and tour guides, will proudly present its sixth re-enactment event, "Lives & Legends: Voices From the Museum."

The 90-minute guided walk through 19 scenes are spread throughout the museum's four-building campus. Visitors will meet famous and infamous Dover citizens and historical characters who have come back from the dead to narrate their stories. In two scenes, these renowned Dover citizens

are still alive and have remarkable tales to tell.


Visitors will learn how some of the museum's most extraordinary artifacts, like its iconic 10-foot polar bear, Nanuq, came to reside in Dover. Along the route, guests will meet the farmer who shot the last cougar killed in New Hampshire (you'll meet the cougar, too), an Arctic explorer poisoned by his crew, the museum's first curators, a Purple Heart-awarded Navy nurse, veterans of the Revolutionary War and the Civil War, a nearly 300-year-old wooden doll, two hale and hardy 19th century sea captains, several striking mill girls from the Cocheco cotton factory, a NH governor, a prominent minister, various 17th-century colonists who are fearing an attack on their garrison, and a famous Dover boat builder.

"Lives & Legends" is a brand new tour, not a repeat of any previous tours of the museum.

The organizers of this year's re-enactment are the same people who produced the previous, popular historic tours of Dover's downtown mills, Garrison Hill and Pine Hill Cemetery. The event is suitable for even younger children. Stair climbing is involved, so those with mobility issues may not be able to do the whole route.

Tickets for "Lives & Legends: Voices From the Museum" are now on sale. Prices are \$15 for adults and \$10 for children 12 and under. You must choose a specific time to start your tour (with maximum group size at 15 people), from 10 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. on Saturday or Sunday. Tours will leave every 15 minutes. Each group is limited to 15 people. Reserve your spots early in order to get the time you want.
