Apple Harvest Day parking and traffic restrictions

Dover Police Chief William M. Breault announces the following street closures and parking restrictions for the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce's annual Apple Harvest Day festival.

On Saturday, Oct. 6, 2018 from 6 a.m. until 5 p.m., the following streets will be closed to all traffic:

- Central Avenue, southbound from Fourth to Washington streets
- First, Second and Third streets, between Chestnut Street and Central Avenue
- Henry Law Avenue, from Washington to Williams streets

The traffic direction on Fourth Street, from Chestnut Street to Central Avenue, will be reversed between 6 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Saturday. Fourth Street is normally open to one-way traffic eastward only, but the traffic pattern will shift to one-way westward during the festival. This is to allow for Central Avenue southbound traffic to be diverted to Chestnut Street, since construction has made the Third Street Lot unavailable. Motorists should expect delays in the downtown area, and through traffic should avoid the area entirely.

Limited parking for the festival will be available in the Orchard Street parking garage, the Library and McConnell Center municipal lot, and the Dover Transportation Center lot. Off-site parking with a free shuttle service will be provided between 9:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. at CVS Pharmacy, at 118 Central Ave., and at Liberty Mutual (100 Liberty Way, off Sixth Street).



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closures associated with the Apple Harvest 5K Road Race, which begins at 8:30 a.m. These will include a closure of Central Avenue from Washington to Silver streets at the start of the race (8:20 to 8:45 a.m.), and a closure of Washington and River streets east of Main Street between 8:30 and 10 a.m. The race will also require brief closures or traffic delays on Court Street, Samuel Hanson Avenue and Henry Law Avenue.

On-street parking restrictions will be in effect in the following locations:

- Central Avenue, from Third Street to Washington Street
- Henry Law Avenue, from Washington Street to George Street
- Third Street, from Chestnut Street to Central Avenue
- Portions of First and Second streets
- Washington Street, east of Main Street

Beaudoin to be presented with Library Director of the Year Award during public reception Oct. 9

The New Hampshire Library Trustees Association (NHTLA) will formally present Dover Library Director Cathleen Beaudoin with the 2018 Library Director of the Year Award on Tuesday, Oct. 9, during a public reception at the Dover Public Library from 4 to 6 p.m. The award will be presented by Mary Castelli, president of the NHTLA. Light refreshments will be served during the event, which is open to all.

Dover's library trustees were notified in September that Beaudoin was chosen as Library Director of the Year from a large number of nominations. In her letter to the Dover Public Library's Board of Trustees, Castelli said the NHTLA was "particularly impressed with all Cathleen has accomplished in her long career" at the Dover Public Library.

Trustees, library staff and City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. surprised Beaudoin with the announcement during a small celebration on Sept. 26.

Joyal, along with Denise LaFrance, Dover's reference librarian, and the Dover Library Board of Trustees, wrote letters in support of Beaudoin to the NHTLA.

In his letter to the NHTLA, Joyal said Beaudoin has long been a champion of leveraging technology to improve access and services at the library.

"As a result of Cathy's vision, Dover's Public Library was one of the first in New Hampshire to convert to an electronic card catalog, provide access to the internet and begin moving towards the availability of more digital content starting in the early 1990's." Joyal wrote. "Cathy spearheaded this effort as the internet 'information superhighway' was first evolving with public libraries becoming the 'on ramps' for public access. Her efforts included coordination with the local school district to ensure that a single library system with internet access and expanded digital offerings could serve not only the needs of the public at large but also our public school needs. It is because of Cathy's foresight and leadership that our DoverNet Library System remains as an information resource model for public library systems serving communities and schools not only here in New Hampshire but across our country."

In their letter of unanimous support, the Library Board of Trustees wrote, "Cathy is one of the foremost experts on Dover History which she generously shares with local museums, civic organizations and city committees. She was instrumental in organizing and scripting many historical reenactments highlighting Dover history through key areas such as our factories, rivers, cemetery, etc., as well as documenting and leading tours of historic neighborhoods. Cathy also provides 3rd grade history walks. She has been published as the author of books about the area and its rich history."

LaFrance, writing on behalf of the staff of the library, said Beaudoin encourages new ideas and creative thinking. In addition, LaFrance wrote that Beaudoin continually provides encouragement and guidance to staff.

"Cathy has empowered the staff to deal with unique issues and problems that can arise in a busy 21st century public library," LaFrance wrote. "Staff members have participated in in-house classes, webinars, and continuing education on topics such as homelessness, mental illness, and

substance abuse. These are sensitive all issues that Cathy herself models best practices for, allowing the staff to learn and therefore become more compassionate librarians and community advocates."

According to the NHTLA, eligibility for the top award includes being an active advocate for promoting libraries, endorsed by the library's board of trustees, developing program and services to meet community needs and enhancing the quality of life, and demonstrating effective management and development skills with staff and volunteers.

Beaudoin has been with the city's library for 43 years, beginning in 1975. She became library director in 1999.

Community Development Block Grant applications now available

The City of Dover Department of Planning and Community Development is now accepting applications from public service agencies, qualified individuals and eligible organizations for grants from the fiscal year 2020 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. The fiscal year spans July 1, 2019 to June 30, 2020.

Applications are available online at www.dover.nh.gov/government/city-operations/planning/ and at the Planning Department. The application submission deadline is 4 p.m. on Monday, Nov. 19, 2018, at the Planning Department, located at 288 Central Ave., Dover, NH 03820-4169.

CDBG workshops to provide an overview of the CDBG Program and specific application requirements will be held in Room 306 at the McConnell Center, 61 Locust St., on Thursday, Oct. 18, 2018, at 10:30 a.m. and 6 p.m. Attendance at the workshop is not a prerequisite for submission of an application. Unlike in previous years, interested parties may submit an application for the Public

Service category and an application for the Public Facilities category, with some restrictions.

Incomplete or late applications are ineligible.

Eligible CDBG activities include, but are not limited to acquisition of property, development or improvement of public facilities, clearance or demolition, public services, and special economic development activities.

To be eligible for funding, certain requirements must be met, including but not limited to:

- Submission of a complete and timely application.
- Support the goals outlined in the city's Consolidated Plan.
- Meet one of the following HUD national objectives:
 - 1. Benefit low and moderate income people;
 - 2. Eliminate of slums and blight;
 - 3. Meet a particularly urgent community development need.

The City of Dover has been a CDBG entitlement community for over 25 years. The HUD program provides annual grants on a formula basis to entitled cities and counties to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment, and by expanding economic opportunities, principally for low and moderate income people. HUD awards grants to entitlement community grantees to carry out a wide range of community development activities directed toward revitalizing neighborhoods, economic development, and providing improved community facilities and services. Entitlement communities develop their own programs and funding priorities. The entitlement grant is expected to be available in the summer or fall of 2019. The amount to be received by the City of Dover has yet to be determined by Congress.

Kirkland Street to close for drainage work beginning Oct. 9

Drain line replacement on Kirkland Street, between Central Avenue and Academy Street, is expected to begin Tuesday, Oct. 9 and be completed within two weeks, weather permitting.

Night work under way on the Spaulding Turnpike

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) announces that night work on the Spaulding Turnpike (NH 16) to facilitate the reconstruction of the Exit 6 Interchange on the Spaulding Turnpike in Dover is under way.

Night construction operations on the Spaulding Turnpike allow for the demolition of the old Exit 6 bridge that previously carried US Route 4 over the Spaulding Turnpike in Dover. Lane closures and short-term detours are in place on the Spaulding Turnpike southbound and northbound for this work. Message Boards, traffic control devices, signage, and uniformed officers/flaggers will be used to help direct motorists through the work zone.

The night work is expected to continue through Oct. 12. Nighttime work hours will be from 7 p.m. to 6 a.m. Adverse weather conditions could delay this work.

This work is part of the Spaulding Turnpike improvement project in Newington and Dover. Severino Trucking Company, Inc. of Candia New Hampshire is the prime contractor for the \$67 million project, which is scheduled to be completed in October, 2020.



Planning Board and City Council receive Capital Improvements

Program

The City of Dover's Capital Improvements Program (CIP) for fiscal years 2020 through 2025 was presented to the City Council and Planning Board at a joint workshop on Wednesday, Oct. 3, 2018. The workshop can be viewed online here.

A video detailing the projects in the first year of the plan can be viewed here.

The Planning Board and City Council will continue to review the CIP over the next several weeks. The City Council is expected to vote on the proposed CIP in November or December.

The CIP is a tool which outlines a schedule for the next six years for capital projects and purchases over \$25,000 which maintain and improve the community infrastructure.

According to Christopher G. Parker, Dover's Director of Planning and Community Development, Dover is excited to release the proposed CIP for the Council and Planning Board's review and hopes the community is interested in learning about future capital improvements in the works. CIP projects range from complex road reconstructions to routine maintenance and replacement of equipment.

The CIP is updated annually and involves input sessions with the Planning Board and City Council, including public hearings. The Planning Board will forward its recommendations to the City Council, after which the City Council will discuss and ultimately approve the CIP later this year.

The Thom Hindle Collection is a 50-year collection of original glass plate negatives taken by early 20th-century New England photographers using large wooden plate cameras mounted on tripods.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, <u>located here</u>.



Oct. 6, 1842 - The cornerstone of the new Town Hall was laid this day, on which occasion appropriate remarks were made by Hon. John P. Hale. A variety of pamphlets, papers, coins and other matters, were deposited in a box under the corner stone, including a sketch of Dover, map of the village, list of Town Officers, newspapers published in town, etc.



Oct. 7, 1852 - Five persons killed and a large number badly injured by a railroad collision near the Wiers - among whom were John H. Smith (killed) and Richard B. Cater (injured and died two days after) of Dover.



Oct. 6, 1858 - The State Fair was held this year, for the first time in Dover, continuing four days, on the grounds near Willand Pond. It was estimated that between 20,000 and 30,000 people attended the fair.



Oct. 5, 1859 - The State Fair was held this year, for the second time in Dover, on Ricker field. The attendance was large and the receipts "\$6,000, a larger sum than ever before taken."



Oct. 6, 1925 - Foster's Daily Democrat in Dover announces it will publish a play-by-play account of the World Series between the Pittsburgh Pirates and

Washington Senators. Also, at 2 p.m., the paper begins announcing the games from the office, play-by-play, through a megaphone.



Tickets now on sale for "Lives & Legends: Voices From the Museum"

On Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 20 and 21, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., the Woodman Museum, along with a cast of 40 actors and tour guides, will proudly present its sixth reenactment event, "Lives & Legends: Voices From the Museum."

The 90-minute guided walk through 19 scenes are spread throughout the museum's four-building campus. Visitors will meet famous and infamous Dover citizens and historical characters who have come back from the dead to narrate their stories. In two scenes, these renowned Dover citizens are still alive and have remarkable tales to tell.

Visitors will learn how some of the museum's most extraordinary artifacts, like its iconic 10-foot polar bear, Nanuq, came to reside in Dover. Along the route, guests will meet the farmer who shot the last cougar killed in New Hampshire (you'll meet the cougar, too), an Arctic explorer poisoned by his crew, the museum's first curators, a Purple Heart-awarded Navy nurse, veterans of the Revolutionary War and the Civil War, a nearly 300-year-old wooden doll, two hale and hardy 19th century sea captains, several striking mill girls from the Cocheco cotton factory, a NH governor, a prominent minister, various 17th-century colonists who are fearing an attack on their garrison, and a famous Dover boat builder.

"Lives & Legends" is a brand new tour, not a repeat of any previous tours of the museum.

The organizers of this year's re-enactment are the same people who produced the previous, popular historic tours of Dover's downtown mills, Garrison Hill and Pine Hill Cemetery. The event is suitable for even younger children. Stair climbing is involved, so those with mobility issues may not be able to do the whole route.

Tickets for "Lives & Legends: Voices From the Museum" are now on sale. Prices are \$15 for adults and \$10 for children 12 and under. You must choose a specific time to start your tour (with maximum group size at 15 people), from 10 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. on Saturday or Sunday. Tours will leave every 15 minutes. Each group is limited to 15 people. Reserve your spots early in order to get the time you want.

Dover's water quality reports available online

Each year, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires community water systems to deliver a Consumer Confidence Report -- also known as an Annual Drinking Water Quality Report -- to their customers. These reports, which are mailed out to water customers by July 1, provide information about their drinking water quality including a summary of detected contaminants from the previous year, compliance, and educational information.
